REGISTRATION DAY.

Tuesday, August 14th, has been set aside by the National Council of Defense as "Registration Day" for the women of the nation. On that day every woman in America over 16 years of age is expected to fill out a card giving information concerning her occupation and ability. The signing of these cards carries with it no obligation to serve the government. A definite idea of the woman power of the nation is desired, and surely every patriotic woman will be glad to assist in gathering this information. This is the first request that the government has made of American womanhood, so let every woman, of every creed, and every race, respond.

The Clarendon committee of the council is particularly anxious to have the county make a good showing and bespeaks the co-operation of every woman in Clarendon. Chairman for the different townships will be appointed, and a list of their names published. These chairmen, or members of their committees, will make an effort to reach every woman in their respective townships, but should any woman not be approached, let

her obtain a registration card from her township chairman, and fill it out.

METHOD OF BUYING ANNOUNCED TODAY

Washington, Aug. 7.—The government's method of fixing prices on purchases for itself and allied governments probably will be announced tomorrow. The question was discussed at two lengthy meetings of the war industries board today. Tonight it was said no definite agreement had been reached.

Two courses of action were debated by the board. They are:

1.—Fixing of one price for each commodity purchased.

2.—Fixing a sliding scale, based upon the cost of production.

In reaching an agreement upon the prices, it is stated, the board must consider cost of production and make an arrangement that will be equitable to all manufacturers.

The small producer is under heavier production expense than the large corporations and necessarily the price he gets for his goods must be higher to allow him a profit than that asked by his larger competitors.
