MORE THAN SCORE

KILLED IN AIR RAID

Germans Bomb South End, in Essex, Forty Miles East of London.

PROPERTY MUCH DAMAGED

Nine Women and Six Children Among the Victims—Fifty Persons Injured.

London, Aug. 12.—Twenty-three persons, including nine women and six children, were killed and fifty persons were injured at South End, in Essex, forty miles east of London, by bombs dropped today by German raiders, says an official statement tonight. Considerable damage to property was caused at South End by the nearly forty bombs dropped upon the town. The text of the official statement says:

"About 5:15 o'clock this afternoon, a squadron of about twenty enemy air-

planes were reported off Felixstowe (in Suffolk). They skirted the coast to Clacton (Essex), where they apparently divided, a part going south to Margate (in Kent). The remainder crossed the coast and went southwest toward Wickford, near which place they turned southeast and dropped bombs in the neighborhood of South End, (in Essex). Some bombs also were dropped on Margate.

"No reports of damage or casualties have yet been received. Our own aircraft were very quickly in the air and they pursued the enemy out to sea.

Two men were injured at Rochford, but four bombs dropped on Margate, in Kent, did little damage. The latest statement follows:

"Enemy raiders caused considerable damage at South End where they dropped forty bombs. The casualties thus far reported are:

"Killed, eight men, nine women, six children. About fifty people were injured.

"At Margate four bombs were dropped. One inhabited house was de-

molished but there were no casualties."

WHEAT AND FLOUR PLANS COMPLETED

Washington, Aug. 13.—Plans for controlling the distribution of wheat and regulating the manufacture and sale of flour have been completed by the food administration.

Creation of a wheat control board will be announced as soon as President Wilson approves its personnel. This board, comprising officials of the food administration and leading men from the grain and milling industries, will be made responsible for putting into effect measures announced last night by the food administration. Regulations governing the control of wheat from the time it leaves the producer until it reaches the baker will go into effect September 1. To eliminate speculation all elevators and mills of more than 100 barrels daily capacity will be required to take out a government license. The hope of the food administration is that the industries will cooperate readily with the government and that many of the drastic powers given to the President in the food control bill will not have to be invoked.

To Lower Bread Prices.

In fixing a price to be paid producers for wheat the food administration, it was said today, will seek to give the farmer a fair price and at the same time name a figure which will permit the public to receive bread at a price much below that now prevailing. Licenses will be granted to flour mills only on condition that they charge a fair and reasonable price for their product.

As soon as the wheat and our industries have been put under regulation the food administration plans to extend its control to bakeries, hoping to reduce the price now paid for bread. There is no present plan to put cereals other than wheat under immediate control, although sugar soon may be under government supervision.

The price of the 1917 crop of wheat to the farmer will be fixed by a committee of which President Garfield, of William College, will be chairman. The names of the other members have not been made public.

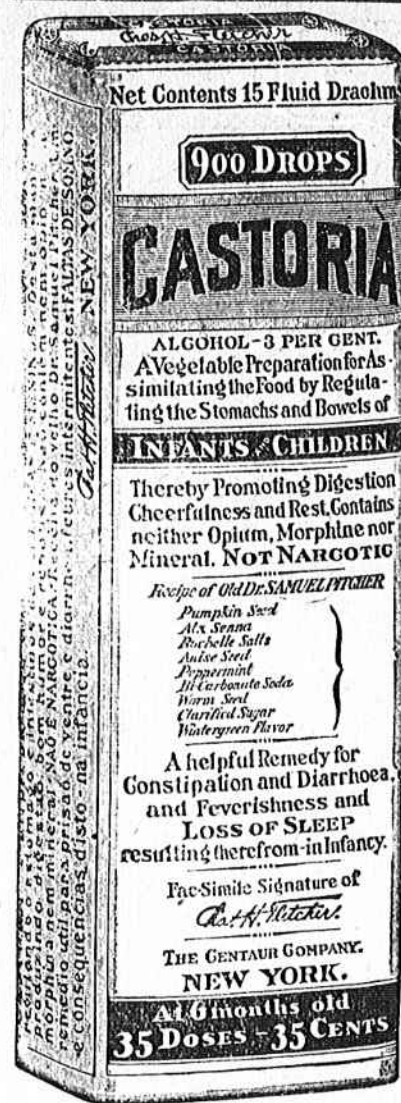
FIFTEEN BELIEVED DEAD
