supplies of wheat and meat we must grow them. We will not be allowed to draw on the food reserves of the West.

This campaign is being conducted in every county in the state. The cards given to the children to present to their parents were similar to the pledge cards used in the Hoover campaign. The farmers are asked to do their bit in this great movement by growing two acres of wheat per plow and one additional litter of pigs more than formerly.

The cards which were distributed will, when signed, be returned to the teachers and forwarded to Clemson College where it will be ascertained the additional increase that may be depended upon throughout the county. Similar campaigns have been conducted in every county of the state.

In every place visited in this campaign great interest was shown in the movement by both teachers and pupils. In cases where no children were in attendance the teachers very kindly sent the cards to the parents.

### PINEWOOD ONE OF CLARENDON'S BIG COTTON MARTS

flank either side of the street where nearly every line of commercial activity is apparent among the busy marts of trade in Pinewood. Going out into the residential section are beautiful houses of several artistic designs, where the tired merchant at the close of the day retires from his labors and, the other residents of the place enjoy their hospitable domiciles.

#### Hotel Facilities.

Miss Julia Brailsford and Mrs. C. W. Bates have a large, commodious house where the traveler and stranger in the city may find a hospitable temporary home during their sojourn in Pinewood.

#### The Bank of Pinewood.

#### Assumed Various Names.

Various names have been applied to Pinewood.
