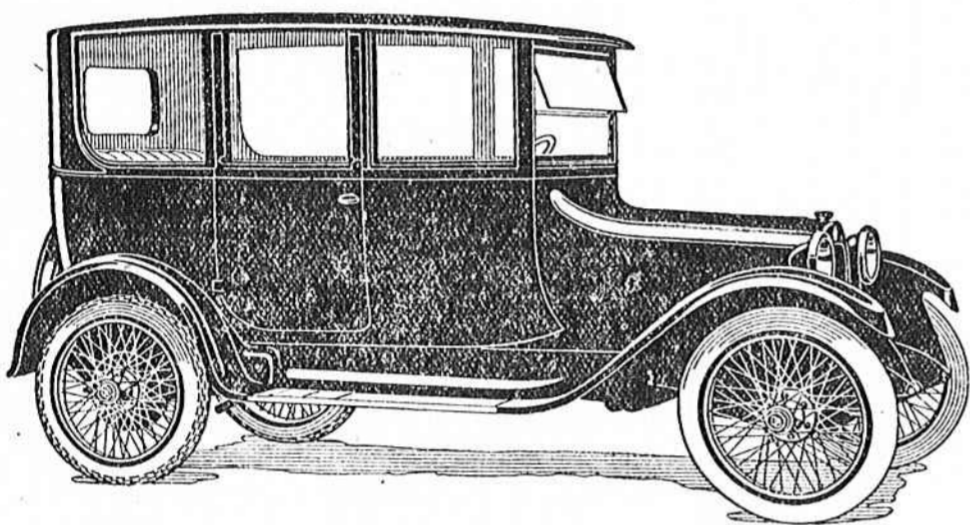

SCHOOL ASSOCIATION HAS GOOD MEETING

The teachers meeting held at the court house last Saturday was one of the best held this session. Mr. W. A. Wright, of the Extension Department of the South Carolina University, was the chief speaker. He delivered a very pleasing and instructive address, taking as his main line of thought the lessons we as a people are learning and will learn, and some of the benefits which will come to the nation as a result of the war. His address was well received. The association then proceeded to a discussion of some matters of public interest.

It was unanimously decided to have the usual field day in April, and a program committee was selected to get up a suitable program. It was decided, however, that the day be converted into a patriotic rally day for our people, and the boys and girls especially. The schools will assemble at the graded school building and march to the court house, headed by a band playing patriotic music. A suitable program, to consist of patriotic songs, extracts and quotations for concert, and the delivery of a ringing patriotic speech by some one capable of instructing our boys and girls along that line will then be delivered. After dinner, which will be served in the usual manner, there will be match games of basketball, baseball, etc.

The association then decided to make the effort this week to complete the work for the government of carding or indexing the occupational cards as requested. All teachers have been asked to help with this work. Yet only a few have responded.

The organization of our schools as members of the Junior Red Cross was then taken up. A canvass of the schools had personally been made and several reports were had showing that some were ready for organization, and others partially so.

These were reported ready. Grange Hall, Baywood and Lesesne Chapel. It is hoped that the others partially ready as well as those not reporting will take immediate steps to do so. Literature has been left with the teachers and it is hoped they will post themselves and take immediate steps to have their schools to organize.

THE JORDAN HOME DEMONSTRATION CLUB

The first meeting of the Jordan Home Demonstration Club for the year 1918 was held in the school house, Jordan, S. C., March 7, 1918 at four o'clock, P. M. We were glad indeed to have Miss Richardson with us after a period of several weeks illness, for she is a leader who is interested in her work.

The meeting was called to order by the president, Mrs. H. C. Cousar, and after repeating the club prayer, the roll was called. There were seven members present. As this was the first meeting of the new year election of officers was then in order. The

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officers that were elected for the coming year are as follows: president, Mrs. M. J. Davis; vice president, Mrs. J. L. Napier, reelected; secretary and treasurer, Mrs. W. O. Henderson, reelected. We had an instructive talk on gardening by Miss Richardson, stressing principally the importance of planting Irish potatoes, beans and onions, principally; also a talk on poultry, emphasizing the importance of testing eggs and conserving the eggs through the summer, and the raising of more poultry.

During the past year we have furnished a kitchen in our new modern graded school building, with a range, a kitchen cabinet and serving table.

The treasurer's report was then called for, which is as follows: balance from the preceding year \$88.35; amount raised past year \$47.85; amount paid out \$87.43; amount on hand \$48.77.

As there was no further business the Club stood adjourned.
