A large crowd of people is expected here Friday to attend the annual Field Day exercises. The Porter Military Band will be on hand to enliven the occasion. The Hon. Thos. G. McLeod of Bishopville will deliver the address. There will be plenty of amusement to satisfy the people.

The municipal election which was held last Monday passed off pleasantly, and with good feeling. There was considerable interest shown, each side working for their favorite: Mr. T. P. Coffey defeated Mr. A. C. Bradham for Mayor, and the following were elected to serve as aldermen: Dr. G. L. Dickson, J. H. Rigby, H. C. McKelvey, S. J. Smith, C. M. White, B. A. Johnson. Mr. C. R. Spratt was elected Public Works Commissioner without opposition. The official vote is published elsewhere.

The County Committee on War Savings Stamps is being rapidly organized in this County. Mr. C. P. Gable, who is Vice Chairman, will have charge of the Four Minute Boy Speakers. Mr. Gable is planning to meet all of the teachers on Field Day and will at that time map out his plan of campaign. One of the features of Field Day will be speeches made by three or four boy orators from Hampton County. Those boys have been invited to deliver their Four Minute Speeches here, and no doubt they will arouse a great deal of enthusiasm.

Mr. H. J. Bomar has been appointed Publicity Secretary and will endeavor to push the sale of the stamps by keeping them constantly in the public eye.

R. A. White, chairman for the colored people, is already actively at work in organizing his race.

The Civic League held its regular monthly meeting at the Court House Tuesday afternoon, April 9, instead of Monday, April 14, as there was important business to be attended to. Quite an interesting meeting was held. Good reports were made by all committees. The chairman of Health and Charity Committee reported some good work being done in that department.

We are going to sell ice cream on the school grounds Friday, Field Day, and decided to sell the cones at the old price, 5 cents, for the children's benefit, the proceeds of this sale going for the purchase of more things for the playground, which the children enjoy so much.

A letter was read before the League from the secretary of Clarendon County Red Cross in which she expressed her thanks and appreciation for the check given them by the Civic League, the amount collected from the Chain Teas. We are always glad to help in these things as we feel that this is a part of our work.

A letter was also read from the National secretary of Women's Federation, asking that each member contribute one dollar and get as much more as she possibly can for the purpose of establishing Furlough Homes "Over There" for our boys that they may get a touch of home life while they are off on furloughs, which request was responded to generally by those present. The National Federation is putting forth an effort to raise \$250,000 this month for that purpose and we hope to send in a goodly amount within the next few days.

Mrs. J. D. Gerald was elected delegate with Mrs. R. E. Broadway as alternate to the State Federation which meets in Aiken April 24 to 26.

Columbia, S. C., April 9, 1918—The Liberty Loan Committee for this State is making a decided effort to have every city and town in the State reach its quota in the third Liberty Loan. Already it has been officially announced that two towns on Saturday, the 6th of April, the day for the launching of the campaign, passed their quotas and will be awarded honor flags by the Secretary of the Treasury.

Both the State Council of Defense and the Central Liberty Loan Committee, of which Mr. E. W. Robertson of Columbia is chairman, want each city or town as soon as it has reached its quota to advise them of this fact so that the Secretary of the Treasury may be informed and a official announcement from Washington made.
