is twenty-five cents. It has been carefully figured that the potatoes costing about three cents, adding one hundred per cent for other charges, another one hundred percent for profit, and then even an additional twenty-five per cent, fifteen cents would be a very reasonable price. Mashed potatoes could be easily served for the same price and thereby save bread.

In other ways, too, Irish potatoes can be substituted for wheat bread. Potato bread is very palatable and is delicious. All Home Demonstration agents have recipes for making potato flour and potato bread, and the hungry millions in the European countries would count themselves extremely fortunate could they provide themselves with so delightful a substitute for the wheat bread they are so sadly lacking. However, it is not possible to ship potatoes, and therefore the slogan: "Potatoes for America, Bread for Europe."

In addition to hotels, restaurants and dining cars using potato substitutes for bread, the householders are urged to cut the wheat allowance wherever possible and use Irish potatoes instead of wheat or mixed breads.

**THE LUCIA MAKES HER FIRST VOYAGE**  
This First Nonsinkable Ship on Which Great Hopes Are Built Is Yet to Meet U-Boat, But Her Inventor Seeks That Most Drastic Test

Washington.—The Lucia, first nonsinkable steamship, has slipped through the submarine zone and is now at an European port.

The Lucia left Hampton Roads, Va., "about three weeks ago," according to Edward F. Carey, director of operations of the United States shipping board.

She carried a "rush" cargo of supplies for the western front, and because of that fact the originally proposed test of sending her without convoy was proposed and she went in company with other vessels under naval protection.

It is expected the Lucia will start on her return voyage within a week or so and will be due here early in May.

Whether she will be made an avowed challenge to the U-boats on her return voyage has not yet been determined, though the confidence of her inventor seeks that most drastic test, with the approval of shipping board officials.

Only the lack of ships, the urgent need of supplies and the fact that the Lucia was loaded and ready to clear port with the very supplies needed, caused an abandonment of the intention to send her to sea openly and without protection other than the buoyancy contrivance of her inventor.

The Lucia's non-sinkableness depends on a multiplicity of portable watertight cells or boxes, secured in out-of-the-way places about the ship and disposed in her cargo holds and compartments to effect a pre-calculated buoyancy sufficient to keep her afloat, even if pierced by one or more torpedoes.

The apparatus is the invention of William F. Donnelly, a marine engineer of New York city. Installation of the contrivance was made by the United States shipping board under the direction of the ship protection committee and the Lucia was about to be sent across then, in February, as reported exclusively by the International News Service but the navy department appointed a board to make a special investigation of the merits of the device for other ships.

This naval commission, headed by Rear Admiral A. P. Winterhalter, finished its inquiry early in March and the Lucia was ordered again to sail the week of March 4, as also was reported exclusively by the International News Service. According to meager information tonight that was about the time she left Hampton Roads on her first voyage in defiance of the Huns.

The Lucia was an Austrian steamship of 9,000 tons, and was seized in New Orleans, where the tests of Mr. Donnelly's invention occupied about four weeks before completed.

**"POTATOES FOR AMERICA, BREAD FOR EUROPE"**

Columbia, S. C., April 10.—As a further means of cutting down the consumption of wheat, this will be the slogan and suggestion in South Carolina of the Food Administration, to which the attention of the people of the State will be directed through several agencies.

Hotels and dining cars services will be asked to decrease the price on potatoes, to make a "service" of potatoes, and thus to induce the public to eat more potatoes and less bread.

Home Demonstration agents throughout the State will be asked to make special demonstrations in the substitution of Irish potatoes for bread, thus bringing the matter directly before the domestic and home-makers clubs in the several counties.

Clemson and Winthrop Colleges will be asked, in their weekly bulletins, to advise the general use of Irish potatoes.

Hashed brown potatoes for instance, are cheaper than bread. The first cost of potatoes for hashed brown is not more than three cents for the portions usually served by hotels, restaurants and in dining cars. The dining car charge for hashed brown potatoes
