Hotels and dining cars services will be asked to decrease the price on po-tatoes, to make a "service" of potatoes, and thus to induce the public to eat more potatoes and less bread.

In other ways, too, Irish potatoes can be substituted for wheat bread ledicious. All Home Demonstration agents have recipes for making potato. flour and potato bread, and the hungry millions in the European countries would count themselves extremely fortunate could they provide themselves with so delightful a substitute for the wheat bread they are so sadly lacking. However, it is not possible to ship po-tatoes, and therefore the slogan: "Potatoes for America, Bread for

Europe." In addition to hotels, restaurants and dining cars using potato substi-tutes for bread, the householders are urged to cut the wheat allowance wherever posisble and use Irish potatges instead of wheat or mixed breads.


