SILOS AND SILAGE CROPS**

Clemson College, June 18. —Those farmers expecting to build silos this summer are advised by the Clemson College Extension Division to make immediate arrangements about getting the materials. Some materials are going to be hard to obtain on account of shipping conditions. This is particularly true of those materials that have to be shipped from some distance.

Farmers expecting to build concrete and hollow tile silos, and who are unable to get materials may still build Wooden Hoop Silos. There should, therefore, be no slacking in the putting in of silage crops.

HOME CANNING IN THE SOUTH
Last year, with only about five hundred women at work in the rural sections of the South in Home Demonstration Work, and the Canning Clubs for Women and for Girls, in the war emergency there were enrolled practically two and one half million women and girls who put forth a mighty effort to conserve the food from the abundant crops which they had planted and from the waste of fruits and vegetables which the South can produce so splendidly. At a very minimum calculation, these women and girls, based upon a conservation of less than fifty per cent of the averages obtained by 600,000 reports, put up nearly 200,000,000 cans of fruit and vegetables for future use, and they are going to do it again, and even better than that this year. Last year they put up for home use over 5,000,000 pounds of dried fruits and vegetables, and they will do better than that this year. At a time when the National Government, through the Army Purchasing Board, is asking from thirty-five to forty per cent of the great canners of the country, the women and girls are going to prove the salvation of the South in food production and conservation.

THE ONE CROP AGRICULTURE

1. The one-crop system is unsafe economically because it depends upon crop conditions and market conditions for financial success; a failure of weather as well as failure of market brings ruin. All the eggs are in one basket.

2. A one-crop system of agriculture does not maintain soil fertility because it gives no opportunity to restore humus, nitrogen and other plant food elements to the soil by the use of crop rotation.

3. A one-crop system of agriculture generally fails to take livestock into account and therefore does not produce either the meat of the country or the manure necessary to soil fertility, nor does it provide other livestock for the utilization of the waste products of the farm and the making of waste lands productive.

4. The one-crop system is uneconomic because it involves long periods of idleness for farm machinery, equipment and labor and does not utilize capital, land and labor to the fullest possible extent. Under a highly diversified system of agriculture, each laborer, with a full complement of tools and teams, will handle more land and have a greater income per man than where the full attention is devoted to the one crop.

5. Under a one-crop system of agriculture, the return for labor comes but once per year, and it builds up a system which involves the payment of the heaviest possible profits for the necessary supplies of the farm, compelling the farmer to sell his product at the lowest wholesale price, while he buys his supplies at the highest retail price. Diversified agriculture produces the food on the farm, requires a minimum of high-priced supplies and saves the money from the cash crops as profits.

6. Lastly, the one-crop system limits knowledge, narrows citizenship, and does not foster home building.
