At a very minimum calculation, these, women and girls, based upon a conservation of less than fifty per cent of the averages obtained by 600,000 reports, put up nearly 200,000,000 cans of fruit and vegetables for future use, and they vegetables for future use, and they are going to do it again, and even better than that this year. Last year they put up for home use over 5,000, 000 pounds of dried fruits and vege-tables, and they will do better than than that this year.
