DEATH'S HAND IS HEAVY

Tillman is 15th Member of Congress Lost Since War Began

Washington, July 5. Death has laid a heavy hand on the Democratic members of the house and senate since the sixty-fifth congress was convened a year and three months ago. The passing of Senator Benjamin R. Tillman of South Carolina, adds a 15th name to the list of legislators who have been stricken since the United States declared war against Germany, and 10 of the 15 were Democrats.

The Democratic loss in the senate has been amazingly heavy. Eight members of the upper house have died since April, 1917, and seven of the eight were members of the majority party. The full list is: Lane of Oregon; Hustine of Wisconsin; Newlands of Nevada; Hughes of New Jersey; Broussard of Louisiana; Stone of Missouri and Tillman of South Carolina. James H. Brady, of Idaho, is the only Republican name on the mortality record.

Four important committees have been affected by the death toll. Till-

man was chairman of the naval affairs committee. Stone headed the foreign relations. Newlands was the interstate commerce commission chairman and Hughes presided over the pensions committee.

The loss by death in the house of representatives fell more heavily on the Republicans than on the majority party. Helgeson, of North Dakota; Comstock, of Indiana; Hill of Connecticut and Capstick of New Jersey, were members of the minority, while Martin of Illinois; Bathrick of Ohio, and Jones of Virginia were Democrats.

The death rate in the sixty-fifth congress, which has averaged one a month, is a record in the history of congress. It was almost equaled during the three sessions of the sixty-first congress, from March, 1909, to March, 1911, when eight members of the senate were called by death. The mortality figures for the lower house of the sixty-first congress were not, however, as high as the total that already has been reached by the sixty-fifth congress.

SECOND CROP IRISH POTATOES

The spring crop of potatoes cannot be carried through the winter, but the second crop can. Now is the time to begin preparation for this crop. July is the best month for planting, but to secure the best results the land must be broken several weeks before planting time. Harrow immediately after breaking, and re-harrow after every rain so as to conserve the moisture and keep down the weeds. The principal trouble with this crop is securing a stand, and it is usually the lack of moisture in the soil that makes it difficult to secure a stand. Therefore this early plowing and the several harrowings are especially important. Small grain stubble is a good place for this crop. Pick out a moist piece of ground, but well drained. —The Progressive Farmer.

FARM HINTS

Early maturing bunch cowpeas planted between corn rows at the last working will make a great deal of much needed human food before frost. If stubble land can't be broken as soon as the grain is harvested, at least try to disk it. This will conserve the moisture in the land and will make it possible for it to be turned later when there is more time. By all means buy a canning outfit this year. Canning is a hard and uncertain job the way it is practiced on the majority of Southern farms so it will be real economy to spend a little money for a canner and outfit. When this is done, some of the men folks ought also to help with the job.

Have you bought that garden plow or are you still working your garden with a hoe (or letting your wife do it)? Garden plows are not very expensive and one will enable you to work the garden in a jiffy. Make a note to get one when you buy your canner.—The Progressive Farmer.

GOVERNMENT RAILROAD ADMINISTRATION

The general policy and purposes of the Railroad Administration as announced by Director General McAdoo may be briefly summarized as follows:

First, the winning of the war, to which everything must be subordinated; second, the service of the public, which means maintenance and improvement of railroad properties so as to provide safe and adequate transportation facilities at lowest cost; third, the promotion of sympathy, understanding and cooperation between the administration and the 2,000,000 railroad employees and the 100,000,000 patrons, which latter includes every individual in the Nation; fourth, the application of sound economics, including elimination of superfluous expenditures, payment of just wages and just and prompt compensation for injuries, economical purchase of material and equipment, adoption of standardized equipment and approved devices for saving life and labor, economic routing of freight and passenger traffic, intensive employment of all equipment, and careful record and scientific study to secure the greatest efficiency.

The Director General states that while the development of this policy requires time, great progress has been made toward the desired goal. He commends heartily the intelligence, public spirit, loyalty and enthusiasm of the members of the Railroad Administration and the officers and employees of the railways.

ALLIES GET 5,000 PRISONERS IN WEEK

Several Important Strategic Points Also Gained

ALL MINOR OPERATIONS

Valuable Information Gained by Allies as to Huns' Future Operations

London, July 5.—During the last week the Entente Allies on the western front have taken more than five thousand prisoners. A series of minor operations also resulted in their gaining possession of several important strategic points, inflicting heavy losses on the enemy and obtaining valuable information as to his plans for the immediate future.

Another satisfactory feature of the last week's operations was the work of the Allies in the air. Great damage was done by the aviators to German communications and concentrations of men and material behind the lines. The superiority of the Entente air fighters is shown by the fact that during the last week, on the British front alone, 173 German airplanes were downed, while only 36 British machines are missing.

The British military reports for the week pay a high tribute to the work of the Americans at Vaux and on the Somme, declaring that the American soldiers have shown the biggest fighting qualities, while their staff work has been excellent.
