To the Editor of Manning Times:
Some time ago I noticed in your paper an article speaking of the need of a Steam Laundry here. It is an urgent one owing to the conditions brought about by the War. Some people say that it is an account of the cotton picking, but that is a mistake, because it existed before the war came on us. There are two classes of labor that we are dependent on here, cooks and washer women. There are quite a large number of families here who cannot get either. The Chinese Laundry here can take care of the collars and cuffs very satisfactorily. What we need here is a laundry to do family washing. Then there will be enough local labor to help those who are really dependent on help in the homes.

It has been said not to have been very profitable in some places in years past. Labor conditions in my opinion will never be the same again after the war is over, and I feel sure that a laundry here from now on will be profitable.
