PERSHING TO DIRECT ARMY OF OCCUPATION

American Third Army Will Consist of About Quarter Million Men Under Gen. Dickman's Command ON MARCH TOWARD RHINE
 Belgian Forces Have Already Occupied Antwerp and Brussels, Now Probably Cleared of the Invader

Paris, Nov. 17.—The American Third Army has been designated as "The Army of Occupation." It will be under the immediate direction of Gen. Pershing, the commander-in-chief, who will be in command of the American positions in occupying territories.
 The Third Army will consist of the First, Second, Third, Fourth, Fifth, Twenty-sixth, Thirty-second, Forty-second, Eighty-ninth and Ninetieth divisions, which divided among the Third and Fourth corps, will consist for the present of about a quarter of a million men. It will be commanded by Maj. Gen. Dickman.

Allies on the March With the Allies' Armies in France

and Belgium, Nov. 17.—The Allied armies have begun their march toward Germany. The Belgian forces have already occupied Antwerp, which was evacuated by the enemy on Friday and immediately taken over. Brussels was expected to be free of German soldiers today.

THIS TRACTOR WORKS

Williamsburg Farmer Tells of His Experience

To the Editor of the News and Courier:

If you will kindly allow me the space, I shall be glad to make a brief explanation of the Cleveland tractor, not as an advertisement for the tractor people, but with the hope that it may be of some help to my farmer friends in making the right selection when they go to buy their tractors, for there is no question in my mind but what we have all got to come to the tractor, and in my opinion the little Cleveland type is the only practical tractor for us farmers in this part of the country.

I am frank to admit that I have been afraid to buy a tractor for the reason I have known so many people that tried tractors and found them to be a failure, but when I saw this little caterpillar advertised it appealed to me as being the most practical looking tractor that I had ever seen, so I immediately got in touch with the people that handle this tractor, and after having them make a demon-

stration I bought one, and I have found it to be the greatest little machine I ever had. We have now been plowing with mine, using two twenty-six-inch discs, and letting them down sometimes as deep as twelve inches, and the little tractor pulled them right along apparently without any effort.

A big crowd came to my place a few days ago to see the tractor working, and just as an experiment, and to show the people that the little tractor had lots of power, we tied two large wagons, together, put forty sacks of

fertilizer on them, then four or five men got up on top of that, making the entire load, including the wagons, something over ten thousand pounds. We immediately then proceeded to where the road had been filled in with sawdust and had been cut all to pieces with the wagons hauling over it, making it almost impassable for an automobile, and nobody thought that the little tractor could possibly go through with such an unreasonable looking load tied to it, but to our surprise the little fellow went right through with-

out hesitation, and from the actual experience that I have had with the Cleveland tractor up to now I can conscientiously advise all those who are in a position to use a tractor at all to buy the Cleveland.

I hope that this letter may be read in the same spirit as that in which it has been written, and thanking you kindly for publishing the same, I am, Yours very truly,
