Bugle sounds "Taps"; scouts salute colors, then Scout Master.

Bugle sounds "Retreat"; military march; scouts retire.

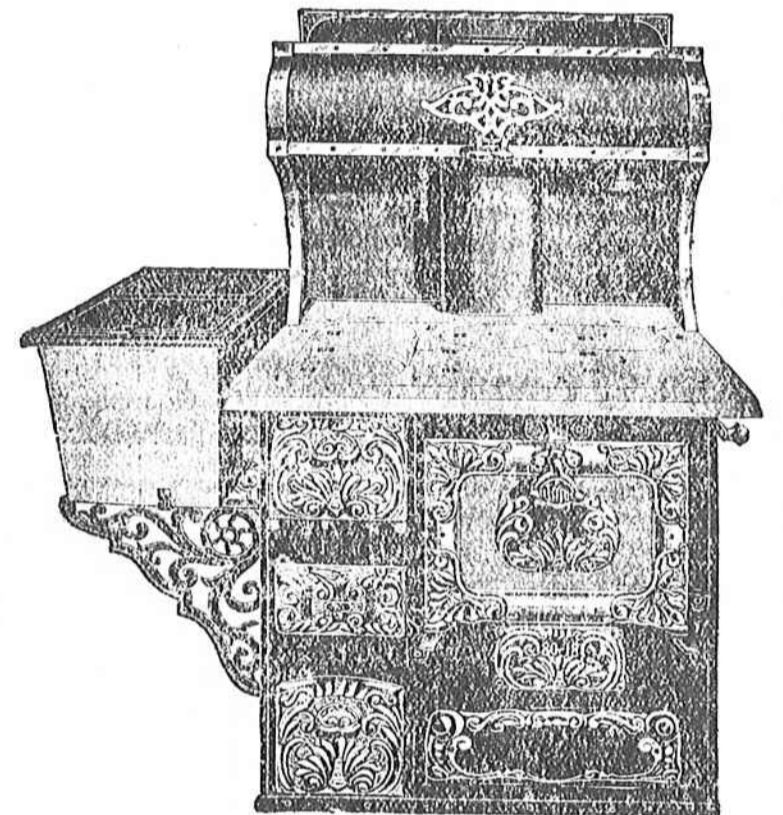
