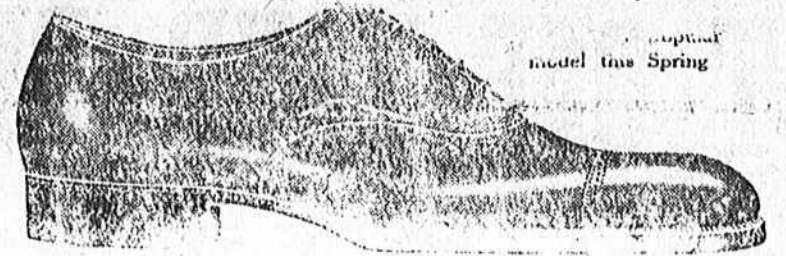

Sergeant Austin Sauls who has just returned from France is visiting his mother, Mrs. Fannie Sauls.

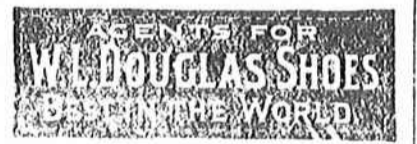
