7,000 RAINBOW TROOPS RETURNING

Among Officers Aboard Leviathan for New York Major Generals Read and MacArthur.

Washington, April 21.—About 7,000 officers and men of the 2d (Rainbow) Division sailed from Brest April 18 on the transport Leviathan, due at New York April 25. Among the officers on board are Major Gen. George W. Read, commanding the division, and Brig. Gen. Douglas MacArthur, commanding 84th infantry brigade.

The transport La Touraine, due at New York April 27, has on board twelve casual companies for various States and 39 casual officers.

The transport Koningin Der Nederlanden, due at Newport News May 2, is bringing the 117th ammunition train complete of the Rainbow Division; headquarters 114th engineers, evacuation hospital No. 18, ambulance service sections Nos. 542, 560, 571, 603 and 601, six casual companies of colored troops and nine white casual companies and a detachment of 141st field artillery.

The transport America, due at New York April 28, has on board the 307th and 308th infantry and 154th infantry brigade headquarters, all of the 77th Division, two casual companies, 42 casual officers and six convalescent detachments. Among the officers on board are Major Gen. Francis J. Kernan, traveling as a casual, and Brig. Gen. J. Price, commanding the 154th infantry brigade.

The transport Pocahontas, due at Newport News May 1, is bringing the headquarters, medical detachment, machine gun company, second battalion headquarters and Companies E, F, G, H, I, K, L and M, of the 112th infantry, detachment of the 109th machine gun battalion, both of the 28th Division, detachments 139 infantry and 128th machine gun battalion and 20 casual officers.

The transport Federal is due at Newport News May 3 with a few casuals.

SEAPLANE FALLS INTO BAY

Norfolk, Va., April 20.—A seaplane of snail type, evidently in distress, and seeking to land, fell into the Chesapeake Bay tonight, according to reports from Cape Charles. It rose to the top of the water and then sank. Rescuers who put out to the scene, more than a mile off shore, were unable to find any trace of the machine or of survivors.

Observers declared that the plane hit the water plainly in distress and that it struck with such force as to rebound several times on the surface of the bay, before finally sinking.

Inquiries at the Hampton Roads naval aviation station brought the information that none of the station's machines were unaccounted for, but officers immediately sent out inquiries. Langley field had also been notified and will investigate, in the hope of identifying the plane.

COTTON FOR GERMAN MILLS

Economic Council to Consider Proposals Today.

Paris, April 21.—The supreme economic council will meet tomorrow to consider proposals to grant a limited supply of raw materials, notably cotton, to Germany to enable the factories there to start work and to relieve the unemployment which is said to be at the bottom of much of the disorder in Germany. The council, it is said, also will revise regulations for German exports required to pay for food imports and probably will discuss the new economic situation created by the slackening of the stockade regulations applied to Germany's neutral neighbors.

After April 25, goods and commodities may be shipped to the neutral countries adjoining Germany virtually without restriction, the neutrals themselves assuming responsibility against the re-export of prohibited wares to Germany. The "black list" rationing and Allied control regulations will be abolished from that date.

Shipments may be made freely after April 21, from the United States and associated countries when consigned to neutral control organizations such as the Netherlands Overseas Trust and the Swiss and the Society of Surveillance without the necessity of cabling applications back and forth across the Atlantic.

RED CROSS ATTACKED

Cable Says German Soldiers Fired on Kovno Mission.

New York, April 21.—German troops have attacked the American Red Cross mission at Kovno, Lithuania, according to a cablegram received here today by the Lithuanian National Council, from its Paris representative. The message gave neither the time nor result was executed in defending the Americans, it was said.

The cablegram reads: "The American Red Cross mission, at Kovno, Lithuania, has been at-

tacked by German soldiers. While defending the Americans one Lithuanian soldier was killed. This aroused the greatest indignation in Kovno and the fate of the hero developed into a great demonstration against the Germans.

No advices of an attack on the mission have been received by Red Cross authorities here, it was said tonight. Officials said the Kovno unit was a branch of the American Red Cross mission to Poland. Its personnel is unknown here, it was said, as the work in Poland and Lithuania was organized in Paris.
