GOVERNMENT AIDS

DISABLED MEN

U. S. Pays Soldiers Well While Being Reeducated

1,459 NOW WELL PLACED

In Typical Case Man, to Remove Handicap, is Provided With Americanized Name.

(Washington Post.)

The 100,000 American disabled soldiers of the present war will neither have to sell pencils or take jobs in such blind alley occupations as night watchmen, for through the activities of the Federal Board of Education in Washington virtually every business, professional, technical school in the country has opened wide its doors for the education and training of the disabled to fill jobs as good as, if not better than, those which they had before the war.

The vast scope of the government's program for the redemption process and reeducation work now under way is shown by the fact that the vocational board has already placed 1,459 of these men in 374 educational institutions and seventy-two factories.

Greek Exemplifies Help.
A better idea of what the program means than any recital of figures as to the number under training and the variety of new vocations they are being prepared to take up is afforded by the case of the first disabled soldier in the country placed by the federal board. In this case the govern-

ment not only is arranging to overcome the war handicap which the soldier received, but has also relieved him of the handicap of a name "as long as your arm" by changing it from the original Greek into "Lewis Theodore."

Lewis Theodore was picked up on the streets of Washington last September by an official of the board almost destitute. Theodore, having enlisted in the army, was assigned to work at his old job with a bakery company. One day during the previous hard winter in camp, coming out after working all day amid the hot ovens of the camp bakery, Theodore took a severe cold which developed into sciatic rheumatism. He was discharged from the service, and by reason of this rheumatism found it impossible to follow his old occupation.

Filled Out Application.
The first thing the board did was to help him fill out an application to the war risk bureau for compensation. This was granted in short order and upon the decision of the bureau that the case was one paying \$30 a month under the law, the vocational experts took him in charge and informed him that in case he desired to fit himself for a lighter job where his rheumatism would not be a serious handicap, the government would not only place him in training, but actually pay him an additional \$35, or \$65 a month while he was learning.

Theodore said he wanted to be a salesman, so the board placed him at once in a local business college where he has since been pursuing with marked success a general commercial course. That was six months ago, but Theodore is still drawing his \$65 a month and will continue to do

so until the board can place him in a good paying position.

Wife Also is Aided.
If Theodore, or others of the 1,400,000 old private soldiers who are undergoing training for new or better paying jobs, has a wife and his training does not take him to a school or factory in another city, he receives an extra \$10 by reason of that fact. If his training takes him off to school and he is forced to live apart from his wife, he is given his \$65 a month while the government allots her an additional \$30 a month.

The commissioned officer who takes advantage of the government's vocational program is even better off. Take the case of Capt. John Doe, who saw overseas service and suffered a complete nervous breakdown as a result of shell-shock and the strain of months of hard fighting in France. As a National Guard or national army officer—he could retire on two-thirds pay if he were a regular—the most he can receive after discharge as totally disabled is \$30 a month, but the moment he decides to take up a vocational course he will receive \$200 a month, a monthly payment equal to his last month's pay in the service.

Being a lawyer in a Southern State and convinced that he would not be able to plead a case in court for a year or two, Capt. Doe told the board he wanted to take a course in higher accountancy. After a short visit to his home folks, Capt. Doe has arranged through the vocational board to take up this work at an institution of standing. If he were a second lieutenant, he would receive a lieutenant's pay while in training. In other words, an officer draws his regular service pay while being trained for a new job or profession.

Badly Conditions in the Hives.
The following specialist of the Entomological Division report greatly increased interest and pleasing progress in beekeeping in various parts of the state. Many beekeepers are writing for information and advice. Just now it is necessary to be watchful and careful in handling bees to get best results. If the brood combs are badly bound it is not always best to try to straighten them at this time when the spring honey flow is on. If the colony is strong and working well, it is advisable to let such a brood chamber alone until this honey flow is over. Straightening the combs often requires much cutting and tearing, and much brood is destroyed in this way.

But if the colony is weak, go into the hive, examine it, and straighten the comb. Combine weak colonies to strengthen them, or requeen. When straightening it is advisable to cut out and remove drone comb if there is a large amount of it, and replace with worker comb foundation.

If there are many drones at this time, causing considerable commotion, it may be due to a crowded condition or an excessive amount of drone comb. There will be some swarming. Have the hives into which the new swarms are to be placed in readiness before the swarm comes out. Be sure to have the new swarm on the old stand as described heretofore. Put some comb in the brood chamber so that the queen has a place to lay.

The queen alley is convenient where one can not be near the bees, as this holds the queen and prevents the swarm from leaving. After a swarm has made one attempt to get away, then it should be watched because several attempts at a get-away without success, and failure to hive it, may cause the loss of the queen.

Use a good smoker and smoke mildly except when combining. Use a good veil, and if you are nervous about handling bees, then wear gloves and leggings. Remember that the best beekeepers use smoker and veil.

SEES BEST RESULTS FROM MONEY FOR BOYS' CLUBS

The United States Department of Agriculture, the State agricultural colleges, and other agencies for the promotion of better farming are spending considerable money in club work among boys.

Does it pay? Here is the opinion of Dr. Thomas F. Hunt, Dean and Director of the College of Agriculture, University of California:

"The College of Agriculture did not, in my opinion, get as effective results from any other equal sum of money which it expended as it did from the amount of money spent on boys' clubs.

"These clubs have been running long enough for us to have some knowledge of their influence on the future lives of the boys concerned. I think I am well within the mark when I say that for the amount of money expended we get the greatest human results."

SEIZE AMERICAN SRIP

Fishing Schooner Held on Charge of Carrying Ammunitions.

Washington, April 28.—The State Department was advised today of the seizure of the American fishing schooner Cape Horn by the Mexican authorities on the ground that she carried munitions for revolutionists. The schooner, which hailed from Galveston, was captured in Mexican territorial waters, according to the advice, and taken to Vera Cruz where she is being held. Formal charges have not yet been preferred, but the State Department is making official inquiries into the reasons for seizure.

BRITISH GET OUT OF FIUME

Anxious to Avoid Clash With Italian Troops.

Geneva, April 28.—(By the Associated Press.)—The battalion of British troops which occupied Fiume with the Italians after the armistice, left Fiume when the Italian delegates to the peace conference left Paris, according to advice from Agram, capital of Croatia and Slavonia.

The reason for this action by the British is reported to be a desire to avoid friction with the Italian troops. The despatch adds that the Italians are reinforcing their troops in Central Istria.

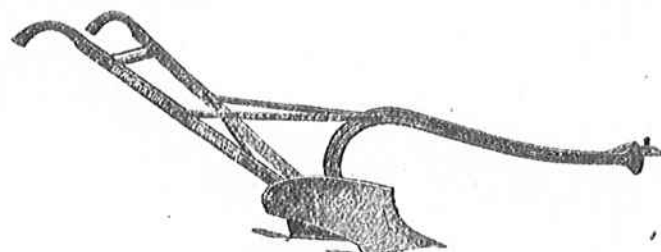
