Washington, July 21 .- It was said y officials that the riots were of a ore serious nature than anything hich had occurred since the outbreak uring the period of the old "feather aster legislature" in the turbulent ays after the War Between the tates before the present form of disnet government was organized. Toight was the first time that the paols of cavalry had patrolled the reets since March 3, 1913, when poee refused to stop woman suffrage emonstrations.


