Tobacco Growers of Clarendon and Adjoining Counties---GENTLEMEN:

Once again I wish to remind you that the Central Tobacco Warehouse is still headquarters for the sale of tobacco at Manning. I think I have thoroughly established this fact this season. We would have handled a great deal more tobacco this season had our room been more adequate. We are going to have more room for our growing trade next season. Our market is closed for sales now pending a settlement of the railroad strike which is one of the greatest Menaces since the war closed. I do not know what our country is coming to, it seems that the strike is very general throughout the United States the papers in the last few days state many of them are returning to their work again. From what we can hear they are the best paid people in America that work for salaries today, and the strike is uncalled for. We hope the situation will soon clear up. We certainly are sorry that this came upon us right in the midst of our season. We fully realize how much trouble and inconvenience it has put the tobacco growers to. Be sure to keep your tobacco well covered during this damp weather, do not let it get in too high order, do not rush your tobacco to market the day it reopens, give the warehousemen time to sell what they now have on hand. Bring your tobacco in gradually, after the opening so as not to crowd the market. Pick the bad out of your tobacco while you wait for the market to open again, and by all means bring it to Cothran.

Cothran's knowledge of tobacco will be your gain.
