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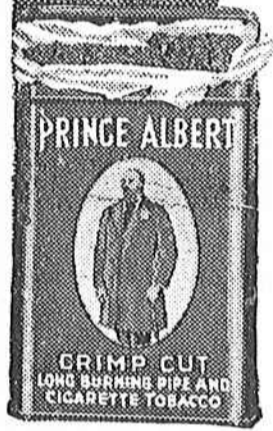

DETECTIVES WATCH MARKETS CLOSELY

Secret Service Men Ready to Nab Profiteers.

Washington, Aug. 9.—Tangible results from the investigation of hoarding and profiteering initiated by Attorney General Palmer are expected to develop in the immediate future as the result of an order today directing the entire secret service of the bureau of investigation to assist the forces now at work trying to uncover instances in which the public has been gouged by the illegal control of prices.

Officials of the Department of Justice said reports from many sections of the country showed the search for evidence of extortion in the necessities of life was proceeding vigorously and it was indicated that many prosecutions might come very soon.

Announcement was made today that Congress would proceed promptly with legislative measures recommended by President Wilson in his address yesterday as necessary to stop the "vicious practices" which have been largely responsible for the rising cost of living.

Machinery Working
Republican Leader Mondell stated in the House that appropriations would be made at once to enable the government departments to attack the problem, and Chairman Haughen announced that the agriculture committee would begin hearing Monday on legislation to control the time foods could be held in cold storage.

The Senate Interstate Commerce Committee discussed suggestions of

the President that interstate shipments of necessities be controlled by a licensing system and Chairman Cummins announced that he would appoint a subcommittee Monday to recommend such legislation as it should decide was necessary.

There were indications at the White House that President Wilson might let the high cost of living share with the league of nations in the speaking tour which he is soon to make. The President has been devoting virtually all of his time recently to the economic situation and has come to believe that the importance of the question demands discussion equally with the big international problem, to explain which was the prime purpose of the tour.

DECIDE TO PUT OFF STRIKE

Charlotte, N. C., Aug. 11.—After facing for a day the menace of a possible strike of electrical workers employed by the Southern Public Utilities Company, which furnishes this city with gas and electric power and lighting service, it was announced late tonight by union leaders that there would be no such strike at present pending possible conference with officials of the company.

This announcement was made following conferences of the workers and union organizers, at which, according to previous announcement, it was to be decided whether or not an immediate strike should be called. These conferences followed refusal on the part of the president, Z. V. Taylor, of the utilities company to confer with a committee of the workers headed by D. B. Goble, representative of the International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers. Mr. Taylor reiterated his former declaration that he would cheerfully confer with any or all of the company employees.

No attempt was made today to operate any street cars, and there were no surface developments in the carmen's strike, which went into effect Sunday morning.

A strike of the electrical workers, if successful, would paralyze most of the industrial plants in this vicinity, in addition to cutting off the lighting service of the city and its population.

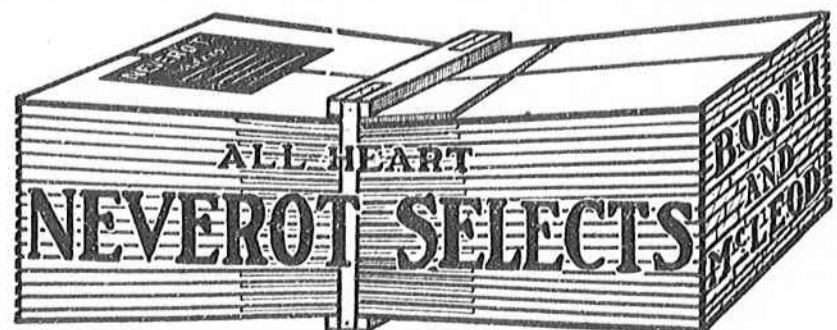
