FINGER PRINTS IN BLOOD

Nashville Police Believe Solution of Mystery Near.

Nashville, Tenn., Sept. 3.—With the discovery of a plainly visible blood stained finger print found on the automobile in which Robin J. Cooper, young Nashville attorney, was murdered last Thursday night near Belle Mead Park, police late tonight stated they were nearer a solution of the mystery than they have been since the body was found in Richland creek Saturday morning.

The finger print was found on the rear right door of the machine and can be plainly seen with the eye at a distance of several feet. An examination of the automobile showed other finger prints but the one most dis-

tinct is a blood-stained print on the side of the door which authorities believe was made by the murderer in removing the slain man from the car.

Expert Bertillon operators have been sent for to make an examination of the finger prints and to photograph the stained car. It is expected that the Bertillon sleuths will arrive Thursday afternoon or Friday. Officers working on the case refuse to say from what city the expert operators would come.

Nashville papers dated July 6, 7, and 10, of this year, and found in the blood covered automobile, are also being examined for finger prints. The papers are also being held for an additional clue which authorities say prove to be of advantage. Chief Detective Robert Moore, who is in possession of the papers, said he felt cer-

tain that new developments would be brought out Thursday in connection with the papers, but refused to reveal his secret.

Still clinging to the first theory that Cooper probably met his death at the hands of a blockade runner or several Nashville bootleggers, the authorities today examined several other alleged liquor peddlers. A woman, whose name the police refused to reveal, was summoned to headquarters late this afternoon and rigidly questioned by detectives. They said they were seeking to ascertain the whereabouts of another whiskey dealer through the woman. They say she knew nothing regarding the crime.

SUCCESSFUL COVER CROP CAMPAIGNS

Clemson College, Sept. 9.—Cover crop campaigns have been conducted in several South Carolina counties recently with fine results. In Newberry county six school district meetings were held to interest farmers in growing more clover and starting alfalfa. These were attended by 88 farmers, 31 of whom ordered alfalfa and clover seed and ground lime. County Agent Mills says: "I find that farmers are becoming disgusted with fodder pulling as a means of getting roughage and only wait to be shown a substitute. One or two acres of alfalfa to the mule on each farm will deal a death blow to fodder pulling."

In Greenville County the clover campaign resulted in ordering 11,000 pounds of crimson clover seed for fifty-odd farmers who have not before planted clover, thus doubling the number of farmers planting clover and more than doubling the acreage in the county.

In Chester County farmers have bought two cars of rye seed for cover crops to turn under in the dough stage as green manuring, many farmers who used rye last year having declared that rye had increased their cotton yields 25 per cent up.

In Fairfield County 360 tons of lime and 3000 pounds of alfalfa seed have been ordered already and orders are still being made.

In Abbeville County a two-day drive for alfalfa resulted in securing twenty new alfalfa farmers, who will plant alfalfa by a close following of the county agent's thorough preparation rules.

STATE FAIR CORN CLUB PRIZES

Clemson College, Sept. 8.—The premium list of the Boys' Corn Club Department of the State Fair has been announced by Mr. L. L. Baker, Supervising Agent of Boys' Club Work, who hopes to make this department larger and better this year than ever before.

There are two classes of prizes, A and B. In class A, prizes are offered for the best 10 ears of corn, any variety, on the merits of the corn. In this class there are 6 prizes namely \$6, \$5, \$4, \$3, \$2, and \$1.50. In class B there will be 6 prizes for the best single ear of corn, any variety. These prizes are \$3.50, \$2.75, \$2.25, \$1.25, and \$1.00. Attention is called to the fact that separate entries will be required for each of these classes, so that a member who exhibits 10 ears in class A cannot select one ear from this number and place it in class B. He must have 10 ears for class A and one ear for class B if he wishes to exhibit in both classes.

These prizes are offered by the State Fair Association, and are separate and distinct from all other state and county prizes, having therefore nothing whatever to do with the regular prizes offered and awarded in accordance with the rules governing the Boys' Corn Club Work.
