

UNITED STATES GOES AFTER MEXICO FOR JENKIN'S ARREST

Officials Declare Government Will See That American's Rights Are Upheld in Proceedings Against Him.

Washington, Nov. 17.—Convinced of the innocence of William O. Jenkins, American consular agent at Pueblo, Mexico, of the charge that he connived with Federico Cordova, the rebel who kidnapped him, the State Department has made strong representations to the Mexican government against Jenkins' arrest. It was said officially

that information already at hand justified the presumption that Jenkins was innocent.

State Department officials regard the charges that Jenkins connived with his abductors a shightly improbable in view of the rumor current in Mexico City that the eighteen peons upon whose testimony the arrest was predicated by the State authorities of Puebla had been threatened with death unless they testified against Jenkins. The peons were said to have been held incommunicado by the police authorities after their arrest at Jenkin's ranch.

According to Mexican newspapers, Judge Franco, of Puebla, examined Jenkins before declaring that in his opinion it was a genuine case of kidnapping. The Secretary of State, of the State of Puebla, however, subsequently ordered the police activities which resulted in the arrest of the peons.

Judge Franco was urged by Luis Cabrera, according to reports in Mexico City, to order the arrest of Jenkins from the bench following his investigation, but he declared there was no evidence upon which to base such action. The governor of the State of

Although representations on the case are understood to have made it clear to the Mexican government that the United States believes Jenkins innocent, it was stated today that a complete investigation would be made by the Washington government. As consular agent, he is not immune from arrest, but it was said steps would be taken to see that his rights are in no way abridged in proceedings brought against him.

DOES NOT SEEK LEADERSHIP

Washington, Nov. 17.—Senator Simmons, of North Carolina, announced tonight that he was not seeking the position as Democratic leader of the Senate to succeed Senator Martin and that he would not permit his name to be placed before the party caucus next month.

In a statement issued after his name had been mentioned, Senator Simmons commended the leadership of Senator Hitchcock and said he assumed no action would be taken during the present session to elect a minority leader.

"Largely because of confinement and overwork during recent years," Senator Simmons said, "my health has been for some time and still is in an unsatisfactory condition, and I would not, unless necessary, wish to incur any duties that might further impair it. Under the circumstances, as much as I might in different conditions covet the honor of leader of the minority, I shall not be a candidate for the position and cannot consent to the use of my name in this connection."

VETERANS CHASE ANTI-LEAGUE OF NATIONS SPEAKER OUT OF TOWN

Ortonville, Minn., Nov. 17.—Ernest Lundeen, former Congressman from the Fifth Minnesota district, who was to speak at a local theater tonight against the league of nations, was taken from the stage by members of the local post of the American Legion, escorted to the railroad tracks and locked in a refrigerator car. The train was just pulling out and it is believed that the trainment did not see Lundeen put aboard.
