Success was attained by simple measures against the breeding places of the mosquito; in rural sections, where the disease si chiefly felt, such measures are often impracticable. Screening of houses by galvanized wire cloth was tested with marked success on a group of cotton plantations near Lake Village, Ark., the infection being reduced from 11.97 per cent, to 3.52 per cent.

Greatest hopes are, however, placed upon measures directed towards eliminating the malaria parasite from the blood of the human carriers. A test demonstration was conducted in year and of the others 22 per cent were "carriers" with the malaria parasite in their blood.
