### FIFTEEN POLIE RECRUITS SHOT TO DEATH IN IRELAND

Party Is Ambushed by From 80 to 100 Men Near Kilmichael—Reprisals Started and People Are Fleeing in Terror.

Macroom, Ireland, Nov. 29.—Two heavy loads of recruits in training for the Black and Tan auxiliary police were ambushed last night by from fifty to one hundred men near Kilmichael and fifteen of them were killed. The bodies were brought here this evening.

Already reprisals have begun, and reports from the village of Johnston, between Macroom and Dunman Way, state that scarcely a house there is unamaged and that most of the shops in the district have been set afire. Residents are fleeing from the place in terror. Here shops have been closed and all business is suspended. Large parties of auxiliaries bearing arms and revolvers are patrolling the area and the people are apprehensive that the auxiliaries will take vengeance.

Sinn Fein Premises Set on Fire in London, Nov. 29.—The premises of the Sinn Fein bank in Harcourt street, Dublin, were set on fire early this morning, says a dispatch to the Exchange Telegraph from Dublin.

Charged With Murder  
Liverpool, Nov. 29.—A young man who declined to give his name, but who said he was a Sinn Feiner and a native of Dublin was arraigned in the police court here this morning on a charge of murder in connection with the cotton warehouses fires Saturday night. He is twenty-eight years old. The police said that the prisoner and two other men were discovered near the scene of one of the fires acting in a suspicious manner. The three men tried to escape when the police accosted them, and the man under arrest is accused of having fired at the officers. His bullet went astray and killed a civilian.

It is charged by the police that the man under arrest had in his possession plans of the premises in which fires occurred. He was remanded to prison one week.

Italians Interested  
Rome, Nov. 29.—Members of the Italian Chamber of Deputies and Senate have received a strong protest concerning the latest serious events in Ireland from the Irish clergy, headed by Cardinal Lorc, archbishop of Armagh. Facts enumerate in the protest and the language used have produced a profound impression especially among members of the Catholic party, who, it is asserted have

taken a decided attitude in favor of Ireland.

It is expected interpellations will be presented in the Chamber and Senate, asking the government if it is not possible for a friendly power to interfere, either directly or through the League of Nations, to obtain a solution that would end the present condition of affairs in Ireland.

### THE VALUE OF VETCH AND OATS AS A COVER CROP

Mr. F. Lee Gaines, a young farmer of Townsville who farms in Anderson and Oconee Counties, has secured some remarkable results with vetch and oats as a cover crop. According to a recent report of George R. Briggs, Oconee County Agent, Mr. Gaines will average over a bale per acre on upwards of 100 acres of cotton. One field will leverage probably 1 1/2 bales per acre. A tenant share-cropper made 22 bales on 16 acres in 1919. On still another field 16 bales were harvested as compared with a harvest of only three bales from the same field just four years ago. Vetch and oats made the difference.

Mr. Gaines turned under vetch and oats four feet high last spring, and his neighbors thought he was crazy, but he told them to wait and see. And they did see. Mr. Gaines sows vetch and oats in the cotton fields in the fall, and while there is slight damage to the cotton, he does not worry over this damage for he is repaid for it a hundred fold in benefits from the cover crop. His farm is becoming a sort of mecca for other farmers who visit it to see what he is accomplishing, and what they see is more eloquent than words.

### PECAN GIRDLERS AND BORERS

Clemson College, November 29.—At this time of the year numerous inquiries are received in reference to the falling of pecan twigs, says Prof. A. E. Conradi, Entomologist. This is caused by the pecan twig girdler. This beetle is about one-half inch long and lays its eggs in the small twigs of pecan and hickory trees. After these eggs are laid in the bark the twigs are girdled at some point between the tree and where the eggs occur so that when a little later these girdled twigs are thrown to the ground by gusts of wind every egg and every grub comes to the ground with them. If these twigs are allowed to remain on the ground until late in the spring the beetles coming from them will hibernate next year. Make it a point to gather these fallen twigs during December and again in February and be sure to burn them. If you have hickory trees near the pecan trees, treat them likewise.

The Trunk Borer  
The insects boring into the trunk and larger limbs of pecan trees should be controlled as follows: If you have no syringe get a small

glass eye-dropper from ten drug store and a little carbon bisulfide or chloroform an inject one or two eye-droppers full of one or the other of these chemicals into the burrow and close the opening of the burrow with paraffin, putty, or beeswax. To close the openings with wooden plugs is not effective and is injurious.

### FARM FACTS.

Thirty-nine fine milk cows have been placed on Charleston County farms in 1920 by the home demonstration agent. This is in addition to 48 so placed last year.

There are 192,664 farms in South Carolina in 1920 as opposed to 176,434 in 1910, an increase in ten years of 16,230 or 9.2 per cent.

Tom Drake, a 17-year-old farmer boy of Anderson County, produced this year 16 bales of cotton on eleven acres. Crimson clover as a cover crop is given the biggest credit in this big production.

J. I. Bradham of Manning, has sold to the Gonzales farm near Columbia a Duroc boar for \$5000. This boar is a son of the \$32,000 Jackson Orion King, is two years old and weighs 900 pounds.

The average corn yield in South Carolina in 1920 will be 19 bushels per acre as opposed to 16 in 1919 and 17 in 1918.

### REDS MAKE GAINS

London, Nov. 29.—The Russian Soviet forces operating against General Balakovich, at the head of anti-Bolshevik forces which remained in the field after the Russo-Polish armistice, have pushed the remnants of the Balakovich troops into the marsh district to the northwest of Mozyre, it was announced in Sunday's official statement from Moscow today. The pursuit of the retracting insurgents is continuing.

### AN ORDINANCE

TO LEVY AND COLLECT TAXES IN THE TOWN OF MANNING FOR THE PURPOSE OF PAYING THE INTEREST ON THE BONDED INDEBTEDNESS OF THE SAID TOWN KNOWN AS 'STREET IMPROVEMENT BONDS' TO THE EXTENT OF \$100,000.00 AND TO RETIRE THE SAID BONDS:

WHEREAS, on or about the 9th day of June, 1919, an election was held in the Town of Manning, in which the qualified electors thereof voted upon the question of incurring a bonded indebtedness of \$45,000.00 for the purpose of improving the streets by paving and curbing the same; and

WHEREAS, the said election resulted in favor of issuing said bonds, and the same have been issued and sold; and

WHEREAS, on or about the 2nd day of February, 1920 an election was held in the Town of Manning, in which the qualified electors thereof voted upon the question of whether or not the said Town should issue and sell additional Street Improvement bonds in an amount not to exceed \$65,000.00; and

WHEREAS, the said election resulted in favor of the issuance of said bonds and \$65,000.00 of said bonds have been duly issued and sold; and

WHEREAS, by the issuance and sale of the said "Street Improvement Bonds" the bonded indebtedness incurred by the said Town of Manning amounted to the sum of One Hundred Thousand (\$100,000.00) Dollars and it is necessary to provide for the payment of the interest on the said bonded indebtedness, together with the retirement of the said bonds;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the Mayor and the Aldermen of the Town of Manning, in Council Assembled, and by the authority of the same:

Section I. That an annual tax of six mills upon the assessed valuation of the property of the said Town, both real and personal be, and the same is hereby levied, to be in like manner and at the same time that other taxes of the Town are collected.

Sec. II. That the said six mills tax levy be, and the same hereby is ordained to be, a permanent tax levy until this ordinance shall be repealed, or the said tax levy shall be raised or reduced by an amended ordinance, and the proceeds of taxes arising from the said tax levy shall be kept account of in a separate account from the other taxes and receipts of funds coming into the Treasury of said Town, and the same shall be applied only to the payment of interest due on the said "Street Improvement Bonds," and the retirement of said bonds, according to the terms of the sale of said bonds, and the redemption thereof; provided that nothing herein contained shall prevent the keeping of the actual funds arising from the said tax levy in banks or other depositories along with the other funds of the Town.

Sec. III. This ordinance shall go into effect immediately and all ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith be, and the same hereby are repealed.

Done and ratified in Council assembled this 2nd day of November, 1920.
