LONG FIGHT AHEAD IN DRIVE ON "REDS"

Government Preparing to Wage Extended Campaign Against Radicals.

ABLE LEGAL TALENT FOR TROUBLE MAKERS

"Slush Fund" Also Available for Financing Opposition Efforts to Deportation--Immigration Service Lacks Men and Money to "Carry on" Properly.

Washington, Jan. 5.—The government's campaign to rid the nation of the more than 3,000 aliens, members of the Communist and Communist Labor parties arrested in recent raids promises to be a long drawn out fight, department officials declared tonight. With the radicals fortified by strong legal talent and a "slush fund" to finance their opposition to deportation and the immigration service inadequately supplied either with the men or the means to handle the situation, the help of congress was considered absolutely necessary by officials.

Anthony Caminetti, commissioner general of immigration, appeared before the house appropriations committee during the day with an appeal

for funds to allow expansion of his force to deal with the hundreds of details involved in completing the deportation proceedings. The commissioner asked for at least ten more lawyers. Department of justice officials have promised assistance but the need for a greater legal staff than is in prospect even with the help of Attorney General Palmer's staff was keenly felt, Mr. Caminetti said.

Officials also explained that through out the country the work of perfecting cases against the radicals held would be slow because of the small number of immigration inspectors. Added to this was the fact revealed by information obtained in the raids, that the radicals have been instructed to make use of every form of delay known to the legal world.

The problem of prison facilities engaged the attention of officials of both the department of justice and immigration authorities as Ellis Island, N. Y., where hitherto all persons held for deportation were kept while the routine of deportation work was being completed, is over crowded.

Secretary Baker, announced he had instructed Major General Bullard, commanding the department of the East, to provide a detention camp for the use of the department of justice, it was understood this would be Camp Upton, because of its proximity to the port of New York from which the next "soviet arks" will sail. Officials were inclined to the opinion that a second camp might also be necessary as a concentration point. If another is chosen, it will be in the Middle West, it was stated.

In view of the department's plans to continue the arrest of known Communist and Communist Labor party members, federal agents in the border districts were instructed to guard closely against attempts of the radicals to escape into either Mexico or Canada. It was apparent that officials had information that the "reds" were in flight in many sections but confidence was expressed that those wanted would be apprehended finally if they were checked in getting on foreign soil. Only three or four such attempts have been made since the raids started Friday.

\$100,000 BAIL DEMANDED

New York, Jan. 5.—Bail of \$100,000 each was demanded by United States

Commissioner Relief Schneider today when John Romanelli, an undertaker; Samuel K. Saleeby, a druggist, and Edward G. Ware, Saleeby's brother in law, were arraigned before him on charges of selling alcohol in violation of the law. The trio are alleged by federal agents to have been responsible for the distribution in New York, New Jersey and New England as wood alcohol which later was colored and sold as whiskey, causing more than 100 deaths. It is understood that the men will be taken to Connecticut and tried on charges of manslaughter.

Dramatic scenes attended the arraignment. Mrs. Saleeby protested that her husband was innocent of the crime and fainted when bail was fixed at \$100,000. Mrs. Ware, mother of the defendant, also declared that her son was not implicated in the case and she had to be carried from the courtroom. Examination of the defendants was set for Wednesday.

SHERIFF SANDERS MUST SHOW CAUSE

Anderson, Jan. 3.—Governor Cooper has ordered Sheriff J. Olin Sanders of Anderson county to appear at the executive chambers in Columbia, Monday, January 12, to show cause why his commission as the governor's appointee to fill the unexpired term of Sheriff Ashley, resigned, should not be revoked and his office declared vacant.

Accompanying the order served by the governor upon the Anderson sheriff is a number of affidavits and statements, including an affidavit from E. M. O'Bryan, a letter from S. E. Whitten, foreman of Anderson county grand jury, and the report of an investigation of the sheriff's office by James H. Craig state bank examiner, and other affidavits concerning official transactions.

Mr. O'Bryan's affidavit is to the effect that while on duty as policeman, in this city, he had occasion to call at his home unexpectedly, and he found that his wife was not in their room, but that the door to an adjoining room was locked. Upon demanding entrance he found Sheriff Olin San-

ders in this room with his wife. Both admitted illicit relations and Sheriff Sanders covered him with a pistol until he left the house, according to the affidavit.

The report of Mr. Craig is of some length and covers an audit of the books of the sheriff's office, especially in the matter of delinquent tax executions and depositions of fines.

Other affidavits are by B. R. Hillard relating to the payment of certain fines to the sheriff; W. F. Moats, relating to his paying a fine to the sheriff; John W. Sammons, chief of police of Anderson, concerning information regarding whiskey cases furnished the sheriff. B. R. Hillard made affidavit to the effect that slot machines seized by Sheriff Ashley were ordered demolished by Sheriff Sanders and that the money to the amount of \$340 was taken out, and this was deposited in the name of the sheriff in a local bank.

R. E. Junkin, former jailer, makes affidavit relating to persons not confined to jail, giving a list of names.

As ordered in the formal order from the governor, Sheriff Sanders will appear before the governor at the date and time set forth to show cause.

NEWSPAPER LEAVES DANVILLE BUILDING

Danville, Va., Jan. 5.—A "dangerous wall," standing five stories high, at that is left of the ruins of the Masonic temple, which was destroyed by an \$800,000 fire which swept the business section here Saturday, night caused the abandonment today of the building occupied by the Danville Register and Bee. The building, which stands next to the wall, was ordered abandoned by City Engineer Linville, who declared he fears the wall might fall momentarily. Blasts simultaneous of seven sticks of dynamite in the ruins of other structures this afternoon shattered window panes in practically every business house in Danville, but did not bring down the Masonic temple wall. About 400 employees in various establishments were thrown out of work as a result of the fire. Origin of the conflagration remained undetermined tonight.

TRADE WITH GERMANY

Washington, Jan. 5.—Growing trade with German was shown in the November reports issued today by the department of commerce. Imports from Germany in November amounted to \$3,266,918, compared with \$2,157,608 in October and exports totaled \$22,441,42 against \$20,664,521.

American imports from Europe in November were valued at \$110,221,781; from South America \$81,915,698, and from Asia \$112,343,818.

Exports to Europe for the month amounted to \$489,183,812 and to South America \$34,118,683.
