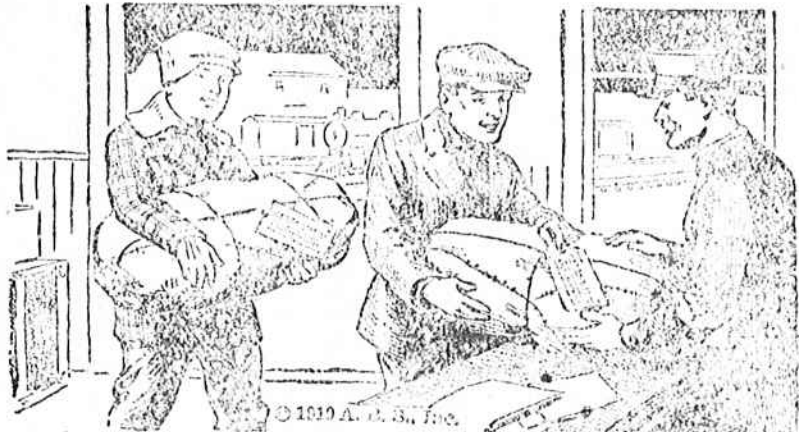

MEXICO'S CHARGE REGARDING AMERICANS BRANDED AS FALSE

Report Boles Wounded With Mauser Bullet—Carranza Soldiers Only Mexican Armed With Weapon—Mexico Complains.

Washington, Jan. 9.—Warnings of local authorities, disregard of which reports to the Mexican interior department declared resulted in the killing of F. J. Roney and Earl Boles, Americans, in the Tampico region several days ago, amounted in the opinion of officials here to nothing more than the waiver which all Americans are compelled to sign before they can obtain a Mexican visa for the Tampico region on their passports.

This waiver, by which the person signing it agrees that no claims in case of harm or death shall be brought by his heirs or employers, has never been recognized by the State Department.

Made by Mauser Bullet
Information reaching the State Department today was that the would sustained by Boles in the foot was made by a Mauser bullet. Carranza soldiers are known to be the only Mexicans in that region armed with Mausers, officials said. Advice given out in Mexico City that the two Americans were mistaken for smugglers of munitions to Manuel Pelaez the rebel chief, were discredited by officials of the department who said that it would be impossible for a vessel to land arms at the point stated in the advice as that territory is in entire control of the Carranzista forces. Officials also regarded as significant that Miguel Sierra, the Mexican who was with the two Americans when they were murdered, escaped without injury.

American Abuses Charged
Laredo, Texas, Jan. 9.—Mexican consuls in the United States are compiling a list of alleged abuses against Mexican citizens resident in this country and it will be published shortly, according to newspapers of Mexico City reaching the border today. The list is being prepared by direction of Hilario Medina, secretary of foreign affairs, the papers say.

Complaint by Mexico
El Paso, Texas, Jan. 9.—Complaint that an American airplane crossed into Mexico at San Agustinz, thirty

miles east of Juarez, will be made to the Mexican embassy at Washington for further action with the American State Department, according to an announcement made here tonight by Alberto Ruiz Sandoval, acting consul general for Mexico at El Paso. According to Senor Sandoval, the machine was not known to have returned to the United States. American military authorities said tonight that they know nothing of such an incident, and that no American machine or aviator was missing.

TELLS BANDITS TO SHOOT

Chicago, Jan. 9.—When six bandits with revolvers drawn, rushed into the jewelry store of Otto Neral today and commanded him to open the safe, Neral refused, saying:

"Go ahead and shoot. I've been robbed so often and lost so much money that I'd just as soon you would."

Whereupon Neral was felled with a blow and with two clerks was herded into a rear room. The bandits crammed jewelry valued at \$10,000 into canvas bags and fled. As Neral raced into the street shouting an alarm one of the bandits leaned out of their fleeing automobiles and shot him in the shoulder.

Fearing he would be shot a second time, he feigned death until the car was out of sight.

DEMANDS DEATH PENALTY FOR NEW

Los Angeles, Cal., Jan. 9.—Death penalty for Harry S. New, charged with the murder here last July of Miss Freda Lesser, was demanded today by the State attorney in opening arguments of the case.

Asa W. Keyes, deputy district attorney devoted his argument mainly to testimony presented by the defense in its contention that New was insane at the time of the killing.

Reviewing depositions of persons who told of peculiar acts committed by New, Mr. Keyes commended that "every queer thing this defendant has ever done might have been done by a sane man."

Keyes asserted that the defense itself admitted that New was a dangerous man and should be confined. The only difference in viewpoint, he said, was that the defense believes New should be put in an asylum while the State believes if he is confined at all it should be behind prison walls.

Keyes asked the jury to assess the death penalty.

ASSOCIATION IS PRAISED

Columbia, Jan. 11.—R. M. Misson, president of the South Carolina Cotton Association, has received a letter

from W. C. Turner, vice president of the Memphis Terminal Corporation of Memphis, Tenn., in which he declares that "that foundation should now be laid in every single county in the South where cotton is produced, for a local warehouse to care for the cotton of the producer as fast as cotton is ginned the coming season, conducted under the laws of the Department of Agriculture of the United States, or under the laws of the State in which this warehouse is conducted."

Tribute is paid by Mr. Turner to the work that has already been accomplished by the American Cotton Association and to J. Skottowe Wannamaker, president of the association.

COTTON PRODUCERS SELL AT 40 CENTS

Troy, Ala., Jan. 9.—Over 1,000 bales of cotton held in local warehouses for the past several months changed hands in transactions completed here today, at an average of forty cents per pound for middling. Spot selling activity revived when middling reached forty cents here yesterday, the first time in forty years, and there was a general movement among producers to sell. Total spot transactions for the week exceed 1,200 bales and over \$250,000 is represented in the sales.
