Similar conditions may be expected in wifeer lines, with money becoming tighter as work ceases. Added to this will the the scarcity of food. If farmers lose their help they can not produce the 對10d necessary to feed the cities and the country towns.

A country town is dependent largely upon the farming community adjament to it. If those farms become non-productive for lack of help the coun-Ary town is a heavy sufferer. And that is the condition in which we fear we will soon find ourselves in the country towns. The insanity of the cities has shape its work only too well. If that insanity is checked in time disaster may pet be avoided. But if not checked soon the crash will inevitably come-and
