the church during the three years since his arrival tracing progress from the disorganized hand full of 1917 to the organized unit of 1920 with its handsome little church complete and paid for. He had "contracted with the Bishop for twelve services a year for which the people were to pay \$100.00 per annum." and had "promised to stay three years. Desiring to render them every possible benefit he had given them one year sixty seven services in return for payment equivalent to twelve." The three years for which he had promised to stay expired last Easter. In answer to the unanimous request of the Episcopalians of Summerton he had pledged himself to remain at Summerton until their new church was complete and furnished, but he had tried as they know at Easter to "transfer Manning to another Clergyman who would give them the morning service so ardently desired by the congregation." The effort failed. "He was accustomed to results." From that afternoon service there were no results." He had "finally concluded to revert to the original contract and (as had been suggested a number of times by members of the congregation) give them one service a month until a new Clergyman took charge of the field."
