DON'T PULL FODDER

An experiment to determine just what loss there would be from plant-"fodder pulled" corn as com pared with properly matured seed showed that there was a decrease of 7.2 per cent in yield; and as opposed to 2.5 per cent in the other, which means a total loss of 16.7 per cent from the use of "fodder pulled"

Add to this 16.7 per cent loss the first effect of fodder pulling (24 per cent edcrease in the preceding year's erop), and you have a total loss of 40.7 per cent. Is it surprising that the yield of corn in the South is so small?

What is the answer? Stop pulling fodder. Plant more hay and stop pulling fodder; but to those who still feel that they must pull fodder, let this be said: Leave at least two or three acres of your crop unpulled from which to select your seed corn for the following year, so that you may keep up the quality of your seed and not suffer the second of the two losses set forth above.


