SENATE COMMITTEE WILL RE-OPEN PROBE

To Meet in Washington Wednesday to "Clean Up Loose Ends" Says Kenyon.

Washington, Sept. 20 .- Objectives of the Senate committee investigating campaign expenditures in resuming its hearings here Wednesday were said by Chairman Kenyon tonight to be the "cleaning u pof loose ends" growing out of the earlier hearings and inquiry into alleged political activities of the liquor interests.

The series of hearings here, Senator Kenyon said, is expected to be concluded Saturday after which the committee will adjourn until after the election except for possibly a twoday conference prior to the election to discuss its plans.

In cleaning up loose ends, Chairman William Boyce Thompson, chairman of the ways and means committee of the Republican national committee, and William Barnes, of New York.
