## TWO FARMERS FINED

Gaffney, Oct. 11.—C. F. Nance and Henry Randolph were tried in the magistrate's court in Gaffney Saturday morning on complaint of Miss Mary Huggins, school attendance officer for Cherokee county. Both men regretted the necessity of violating the law, as they took the position that they could get no help to gather cotton, and that as a consequence they were compelled to keep the children at home in order to help gather the crops. Fines of \$15 and \$5 were imposed, both defendants promising to send the children to school as soon as they could.

## STEAL LIBERTY BONDS

Gaffney, Oct. 11.—It was reported in Gaffney Saturday that the Bank of Grover, N. C., had been broken into

and about \$5,000 worth of Liberty bonds stolen. The door to the vault was blown open and the bonds taken, but it is said the thieves did not succeed in gaining entrance to the inner compartment of the vault, where the money of the bank was stored. The bank has offered a substantial reward for the thieves, but it is understood that there is absolutely no clue as to the identity of the guilty parties.
