


Jesse Gappins, one of the three convicted murderers of William Brazell, the young Columbia taxi driver, and who is now in the death house at the penitentiary awaiting October 21, the date set for his electrocution, will not be electrocuted on the day set, an appeal to the supreme court staying the death penalty until this court can hear the case
