## GIRL'S BODY FOUND

Chattanooga, Oct. 17.—Vernie Peterson, aged 12, was found in a rear room of the home of her foster mother, Mrs. Mary Peterson, on Sunny mountain, near Trenton Ga., today with her throat cut, and the mountains are being searched by a posse for a man who is suspected of having killed the girl. Investigation by the authorities disclosed, it was said, that the girl apparently was attacked while playing a piano in the front of the house and carried into a rear room. Mrs. Peterson had left the house for a few minutes and when she returned discovered the lifeless body of the child. The man being sought is said to be well known to the family.
