TO INVESTIGATE THE COTTON MARKET

New York, March 21.—Evidence in a recent "John Doe" investigation of the American Cotton Exchange, accused of operating a bucket shop will be presented to a grand jury tomorrow, District Attorney Banton announced today.

Assistant District Attorney Simmons who will present the case against the exchange, announced the hearing would require several days. It is understood that all witnesses who testified at the "John Doe" hearing or who may be called during the grand jury investigation, will receive immunity from prosecution. 
