LIVESTOCK MEETING AT SUMTER, FEBRUARY 24th

Will Outline Plan of Financial Assistance For Livestock Growers

A meeting will be held at Sumter on the 24th by the South Carolina Co-operative Livestock Association under the auspices of the Chamber of Commerce to present a plan for the financial assistance of livestock growers.

The following gentlemen will speak: Senator Niels Christensen, R. C. Horne, Jr., Secretary of the Livestock Association, Mr. W. A. Campbell, President of the Association and L. L. Barret, Manager.

This association is organized under the South Carolina Co-operative Marketing Act of 1921 of the State of South Carolina. Under this Act the South Carolina Livestock Association is enabled to borrow money from the War Finance Corporation, which they will in turn loan to livestock growers for agricultural purposes, including the breeding, growing, fattening and marketing of livestock.

The Association will loan money to its members and it is planned that they will loan them as much as 75 per cent of the value of their livestock in some cases.

The Association will also market co-operatively the livestock of its members and will not only help them to get the highest price for their livestock, but will assist them to raise the grade of their stock, and loan them money to hold on to their livestock until a better market is available.

Every man who owns livestock or contemplates owning livestock is urged to attend this meeting and learn just what the association can do for him.

A barbecue was held Tuesday afternoon at the home of Mr. Howard Tidale, near Paxville. Several Manning people were in attendance.
