

BRINGING RELIGION TO KNIGHTS OF THE CROSSCUT SAW

Probably not many men during their life work have met with more thrilling adventures and yet remain-ed unharmed, than has David Cruden. As a boy he spent hours poring over stories of adventure. While he read of deeds of men in the Far West and North, of the mounted police and the lumberjacks, he longed in his little home in Scotland for a glimpse of the great and unexplored territories with which the fictionists seemed so famil-Years afterward, Fate led Crutacked by a black hear and packs of timber wolves, caught in the midst of a log jam, surrounded in his home for three days by forest fire, Cruden came through unscratched.

But these have not been the things which have worried Cruden most. Four children have come to grace the Cruden household. The first, David, Jr., now 12 years old, was bor in England; Harry, 10, claims Scotland as his birthplace; Clifton, eight, was born in McMillan. Michigan, and born in McMillan, Michigan, and Adela, four, was born in Canada. "When these four grow up and ar-

gue over the relative worth of their various birthplaces. I don't know how I shall settle the disputes." said Cruden. "Probably the same God will come to my aid who has carried me through many another perilous place.'

Thereupon hangs the story.

David Cruden decided early in life
to be a minister. Then he was married and it was while finishing his theological studies in England that first child was born. He returned to Scotland, later to America and finally was assigned to the little town of Barwick, Ontario. He took his sta-tion up north, "where," he says, "the valleys are chock-full of silence and crystal air is bathed in pine scent." There, several weeks ago, the Rev. Mr. David T. Cruden finished six years' preaching the gospel to the

His wasn't a wh te-collar job with railing in front of the pulpit, a pipe organ and a choir. The Rev. Mr. Cruden would mount his dog, sled, drive miles, pull into a lumber camp, unhitch, feed his huskies at the cook-shack door and deliver his service and do mon across a log.

"Sometimes at meals, when the men were all gathered around, we could have a little 'song fest,' or I might be allowed to deliver a short prayer, but out in that great open country, but out in that great open country, with God all around, those men had no time for a peg with clothes on it and a lot of fine words," he said.

"They were men and had no time

fe any one who was not one of them. A minister had to go out and rough it the same as the natives. He had to give and take. It was a continual battle against the elements as well as the devil.

"Out 60 miles past—the edge of civilization a race of men have grown up who are honest and God-fearing," continued the minister. "It is part of the unwritten law of the timberof the unwritten law of the timber-lands to respect the rights and wishes of the other fellow. The men are bol-sterous, yes. They talk loudly, cer-tainly. Swear? They do, but not many times. I believe, in the way that takes the name of the Lord in vain. The men I knew at the little town of Barwick were not a bad lot. In the phraseology of the country are corressive words that are conare expressive words that are con-demned in polite society, but it is hard for me to believe that a sin was ommitted every time a man said

Not all the work done in the lumber regions was actually in the camps themselves, for the minister had a church at Barwick. When he first ninister had a When he first went there he found no parsonage just the church. For a while he lived at a hotel. Two hundred and fifty claimed Barwick as their home. The church was a schoolhouse on week days. Later, a house was given to him. Different camps near by donated the lumber, men came for one day to assist in the erection of the frame The remainder of the building was done by the minister himself. He painted the outside, two shades of green, hiding it among the pines that

stood in the yard.
On the first New Year's night he spent in the Northland, the minister came driving across the hills and valleys on his return from assisting at a religious service some 40 miles from his home. The moon was down and the northern lights shone in the sky. His horse champed the bit in and there appeared from behind a bush two balls of fire. It was the boldest of a large pack of timber wolves. The lantern on the dashboard of the cutter showed a

crouched, ready to spring when the sleigh drew near. A shot from a rifle killed the wolfe. From then until morning the pack was kept at a distance by a large fire built of balsam branches and by glowing brands thrown at the animals when they centured near.

Once, later, the minister was attacked by wolves, this time by a small pack, and the dogs he was driving that cold winter night saved him until he could build a fire.

Several times, while the Rev. Mr. Cruden was figuratively saving lives, both man and beast almost cost him his own. One day a lumberiack ston-


