Messrs. Logan, Morrison and Hutto Tell the Voters of Their Platforms

Messrs. W. Turner Logan, of Char leston, incumbent; J. B. Morrison, of McClellanvile, and I. S. Hutto, of St. George, candidates for the Democratic nomination as Representative from

the First Congresisonal District, spoke at the campaign meeting in the Hibernian Hall last night. The district includes the counties of Charleston, Colleton, Clarendon, Berkeley and Dorchester.

Mr. Logan received much applause when he was introduced to the audience. gress he had worked for the district, always considering the welfare of the farmers. Mr. Morrison stressed the need of good roads and vocacy of the State Highway Commission and of the Santee river bridge.
