

An Extract from the Acts of the General Assembly of the State of South Carolina passed at the regular session in 1921.

An Act To Promote and Further Cooperative Marketing.

SECTION 24—Inducing members to violate contract or malicious spreading of false reports concerning association, a misdemeanor—Penalties.

Any person or persons or any corporation whose officers or employees knowingly induce or attempt to induce member or stockholder of an association organized hereunder to breach his marketing contract with the association, or who maliciously and knowingly spreads false reports about the finances or management thereof shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and subject to a fine of not less than One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars and not more than One Thousand (\$1,000.00) Dollars for such offense, and shall be liable to the association, aggrieved in a civil suit in the penal sum of Five Hundred (\$500.00) Dollars for each such offense.

Approved the 29th day of March, A. D., 1921.

A SURE CASH INCOME FROM YOUR HOGS

In reorganizing the agriculture of Clarendon County to take care of the new conditions, it is of the greatest importance that we consider well the new branches of farming from every angle.

For quick and generous returns on one's investment the production of pork offers unusual advantages. In visiting a few of our farmers recently with S. D. Sims, Livestock Specialist for the Pee Dee District, it was very encouraging to learn that some of them were depending on their hogs for a considerable portion of the farm income.

The hog fits in exceedingly well with our climate and the forage crops that we can successfully produce. There are few sections of the United States where pigs can be raised so cheaply. Especially is this true during the first few months of the pigs' life.

On the farm operated by J. Q. Ross near Rimini a good system of swine production is being practiced. Mr. Ross's herd is composed chiefly of purebred Duroc Jerseys, and he believes in feeding. He uses oats and rye pasture in the winter, rape in the spring and fall, Bermuda and Lespedeza in the summer, also corn and velvet beans or corn and soybeans for fattening in the fall. His hogs are cultivated and rotated frequently to reduce the danger from parasites and disease. Besides the feeds mentioned Mr. Ross feeds a variety of waste materials such as cull sweet potatoes etc. This is an excellent system of hog farming. Some of the animals are sold for breeding stock, but the general practice here can be carried on at a profit if the animals are sold for pork prices.

H. K. Beatson near Manning is another man who is profiting from hogs. He states that his hogs proportionately returned him more profit than any other part of his farm last year. Mr. Beatson shipped a little more than a half car of porkers this spring and the balance were sold on his local market. All the hogs grown by him are sold for pork.

During early life up until fattening period Mr. Beatson's hogs are on a maintenance ration made up for the most part of pasture with a little corn. Mr. Beatson has a good Bermuda-Lespedeza pasture which returns him a good income per acre. In the fall these hogs are turned on corn and velvet beans for fattening. They are good thrifty stock which have not been pampered but do exceedingly well in the feed lot. Next year he expects to try some corn and soy beans for grazing. This combination is excellent, the soy beans being a little more palatable than the velvet beans, thereby causing the hog to more nearly balance his ration.

Farmers who do not raise at least enough meat for home and plantation consumption are missing an excellent money saving opportunity, and as a

money crop hogs offer an attractive proposition.

WEST POINT EXAMINATION

Announcement is made by the Honorable W. Turner Logan, Congress-

man from the First District that he has arranged with the United States Civil Service Commission to hold a competitive examination for an appointment to West Point to fill a vacancy occurring July 1923.

The Civil Service Commission will hold this competitive examination on Saturday, October 28th, 1922 at Charleston, Manning, Walterboro and Summerville. Candidates will be examined in the following branches: Algebra; Plane Geometry; Composition and Literature; U. S. History; Ancient History; Medieval History and Modern History.

Applicants for admission must be bona fide residents of the State of South Carolina and of the First Congressional District, not under 17 nor over 22 years of age on the date of admission and not less than 5 feet 4-inches in height.

Congressman Logan will be glad to have any young man meeting the above requirements who desires to take this examination communicate with him and he will give him permission to take the examination and will furnish him with all the information available in regards to same.

Congressman Logan earnestly hopes that the young men of his District will avail themselves of an opportunity to go to West Point.

MRS. VANDERBILT TO OPEN THE STATE FAIR

South Carolina's 1922 State Fair will open Monday, October 23, with elaborate ceremonies. The date has been officially designated as "Ladies Free Day." The management extends to the women of the State a most cordial invitation to be present and view the many educational exhibits and enjoy the myriads of amusements and attractions. It is expected that fully thirty thousand women will be present that day and arrangements are being made to handle the largest crowd ever present at the State Fair.

Of additional interest to the ladies will be the fact that one of their own sex will preside at the opening ceremonies. Mrs. George W. Vanderbilt has advised acceptance of an invitation extended by the management to act as Chairman of the day. Mrs. Vanderbilt is intensely interested in fair work, believing that these exhibitions are of untold value to the program of a state. At the present time she occupies the unique position of President of the North Carolina State Fair and is the only lady in the land thus honored.

Mrs. Wilson G. Harvey, General Chairman of the Women's Committee is planning a series of entertainments in honor of Mrs. Vanderbilt. Full details of these will be announced in

the near future. At present she is contemplating appointing a general reception committee consisting of five ladies from each county in the State, in addition to numerous other committees. The visit of Mrs. Vanderbilt will be one of the outstanding social events of the entire State.

ARE BEEF CATTLE PROFITABLE TO YOU?

Clemson College, July 31.—"That South Carolina has a great dormant resource in her future meat producing capacity, a resource which will be gradually developed, and which will utilize the cheap untillable lands of the state," is the opinion of Prof. L. V. Starkey, Chief of the Animal Husbandry Division, who has just returned from Western North Carolina, where the chief source of income for the farmer is cattle. It is surprising but true, that the farmers in this section are in good circumstances. They are living in comfortable houses and seem to have incomes which supply their needs.

"In fact, in traveling over several states of the South and West I have yet to see a livestock section which is not prosperous," continues Prof. Starkey.

Good Pastures, Profitable Beef Production

There are many farmers in South Carolina who believe that on the average beef production does not pay. Perhaps they are right. But we have the right to ask why is it that it does not pay? There are several things which might contribute to the correct answer to this question, some of which are poor soils, poor pastures, scrub cattle, free range, diseases, and the like. Prof. Starkey is of the opinion, however, that when we get the right sort of pasture, beef production will pay.

There are thousands of acres of idle land in South Carolina, and as soon as these acres are put under fence and the soil which is now bare is covered with grass, beef production can be made profitable.
