READ AND SAVE MONEY

If you are interested in schools and school books I shall be glad to have you read this, as it may save you money.

The newly adopted school books will be in use for the next five years and at the present high prices, and it behooves each and every one to save all the money he can. This is not the time or place to explain why books are high, yet there are good reasons. Your opportunity lies in not buying more of them than you can help.

Every school has the right and privilege of using any of the old books which have been in use for the past five years until December 1923—more than a year longer before dropping into the new adoption.

It is suggested to all teachers that they have the pupils bring all their old books to school, and to ascertain whether or not it is possible to classify them in such as they have until they have completed their old books before buying new books for the next grade. In this way the pupils can use their old books until they have completed a grade and then when new books must be purchased then let them buy the newly adopted ones. If this is generally done throughout the county it will save much money to the patrons.

Owing to the present financial stringency and the outlook now confronting everyone, it certainly behooves each to try to make his dollar reach as far as possible.

The books are being handled at the county superintendent's office in the Court House this year, and I am making every effort to have the books on hand when called for, yet I am more interested in saving you money than I am in making sales.

I feel sure if the teachers and patrons will have a "get-together" meeting and go over the situation you can arrange it so that no wholesale changing will be done, and when done you will know that it could not be avoided.

DEPUTIES PLACE BAN ON GAMBLING

Portland, Ore., Sept. 19.—Raffles gambling and gambling devices are repugnant to God's laws and should not be tolerated in the church, according to a resolution adopted today by the house of deputies of the Protestant Episcopal church in general session here. The house of bishops adopted a coat of arms for the church to be used on all stationery and official

document. A flag with a red cross on a white field was approved also by the bishops. The design of the coat of arms shows on a silver field a cross in red surrounded by a border in blue charged with stars in silver, all surmounted by a mitre. The bishops concurred in a resolution adopted by the deputies referring to a committee the matter of the common communion cup.

Charges against Bishop William M. Brown, retired, of Arkansas were dropped when a committee was discharged from further consideration of a petition from the diocese of Arkansas asking that Bishop Brown be brought to trial for heresy in connection with statements in a book which he had published.
