with the state department the question of importation of liquors for medicinal purposes, the laws of other countries requiring a rum ration on their ships and liquors for the embassies. All of these are prohibited in the new ruling, it was said, but are sanctioned under the Volstead act.

ROBBED OF GLAND STARCH FOR THIEF

Chicago, Oct. 16.—While the medical fraternity of Chicago today joined in the unusual search for the thief who robbed Joseph Wezinak of one of his glands, they pointed to the legal complications which would be certain to arise should the thief be captured.

Dr. C. Frank Lydston, a pioneer in gland transplantation, is opposed to even purchasing glands from living persons. He said that such procedure is unnecessary, as the same results were obtained by him by using the tissue from persons killed in accidents.

German surgeons, it was pointed out, foresaw the possibility of wholesale glands with the increasing demand among wealthy men for such tissue to bring about their rejuvenation.

Resortin to such methods as in the case of Wozniak, it was said, are unnecessary as there are undoubtedly hundreds of persons who would sell their tissues for reasonable sums.

The theft of Wozniak's gland Thursday night, the first record in police annals, was engineered by a skillful surgeon, said Dr. A. S. Sampolinski, Wozniak's physician. The wound was carefully sewn with surgical catgut and all precautions were taken to prevent infection, he pointed out.

SOUTH CAROLINA MEN INSPECT LOCAL MARKET

A party composed of prominent farmers and merchants of Clarendon county, South Carolina is in the city investigating the manner in which tobacco is being marketed on the Wilson market. The party is made up of Mr. R. D. Cothran, warehouseman of Manning, Mr. W. Croskey Plowden and Mr. J. H. DuBose, supply merchants and farmers from the famous Pudding Swamp section, and Mr. W. T. Kennedy and Mr. J. W. Morris also of Clarendon county.

Mr. Cothran stated that he had heard eighty per cent of the tobacco in eastern Carolina was being sold by the co-operative plan and that he and his friends were anxious to come to Wilson and see how the tobacco was being sold. Mr. Cothran declared that he and his companions were elated at the high prices being paid on the Wilson market and were impressed with the gigantic quantities of tobacco sold here. He said he saw the Wilson market blocked with four sets of buyers in action in every warehouse.—Wilson, N. C. Daily Times.

NEW AIRPLANE SPEED RECORD

Mt. Clemens, Mich., Oct. 17.—(By the Associated Press.)—Traveling at a greater speed than any human being ever before attained, Lieut. R. L. Maughan, army pilot, today set a new world's airplane speed record by covering a one-kilometer course at the rate of 248.5 miles an hour.

BOOZE ORDER EXTENDED UNTIL OCTOBER 21

Thirsty Voyagers On High Seas Granted One Week's Respite—Prohibition Enforcement Not to Take Place Till Next Saturday, October 21.

Washington, Oct. 17.—Thirty voyagers on the high seas were today granted one week's respite from the impending rumless ship ruling.

The order permitting vessels with liquor aboard touching at American ports, to be effective today, was extended to October 21.

The extension followed a conference of Prohibition Commissioner Haynes with President Harding. The brief order follows:

"Because of pending indictments and in order to give full time for compliance with the terms of the operation of the attorney general to the effect that the transportation and sale of liquors on American ships, and on foreign ships in the territorial waters of the United States, are unlawful, notice is hereby given that the time for compliance therewith is hereby extended from October 4 to October 21, inclusive, as applicable to foreign vessels leaving their home ports, or American vessels leaving foreign ports on or before October 14."

Can Complete Round Trip
It was explained that this would

permit ships leaving foreign ports by October 21 to complete their round trip to America, even with liquor aboard. American ships leaving foreign ports before October 21 will be permitted to carry stores with them. This applies to privately operated ships, however, as the shipping board vessels have already put the order into effect.

The decision to do this, it was said, was to relieve a few shipping concerns who already had booked passengers for extensive cruises. Some of these cruisers will last two and three months before the American vessel will again come within the area where they will have to discharge liquor cargo.

Another reason for the delay, it was reliably learned, is that officials have not been able to reach an agreement on all of the problems concerned.

Will Enforce Law

Secretary of the Treasury Mellon, whose department will enforce the law is inclined to act leniently until the opinion has been thoroughly tested in the higher courts.

He does not wish to ban liquor on privately owned or operated American vessels leaving the United States port until the foreign vessels have been deprived of the privilege of entering American ports with liquor aboard, it was said.

Every effort will be made by the department of justice to expedite the test cases on the liquor opinion to the supreme court.
