B. Harris, State commissioner of agriculture, has sent to The Times an article which is entirely too long for use in these columns telling why publication of The Market Bulletin, issued for some time by his office, has been discontinued. We can tell the story—albeit the story will be somewhat different—in one-tenth the words Mr. Harris uses. Publication of The Market Bulletin was discontinued about a month ago because the fund set aside by the Legislature at the 1920 session to be used to pay for printing the publication throughout the year was used faster than the Legislature intended. Seeing several weeks ago that the fund was about exhausted, Mr. Harris applied to the general contingent fund committee for additional funds with which to keep it going the balance of the year. The contingent fund committee refused to grant the application on the grounds that the commissioner knew at the beginning

of the year how much money he had to use for the publication and that he should have made it do. It will perhaps be a matter of surprise to many to learn that The Market Bulletin was costing the taxpayers of South Carolina something like \$12,000 a year for printing and postage alone—entirely too much in the opinion of some and a wholly unwarranted use of the public funds in the opinion of others. Why ask these latter citizens, should every taxpayer in South Carolina have to put up money to keep going a publication issued in the interest of so few citizens of the State? The Market Bulletin, it might be well to explain, is a free advertising medium through which John Brown tells Bill Jones that he has a calf, a bushel of oats,

a rabbit dog or a setting of hen's eggs he wishes to get rid of. It is a "for sale," "want" and "exchange" publication which comes in direct competition with the newspapers of the State and deprives them of business to which they are entitled.—Fort Mill Times.

OFFICER NOTIFIED HIS BODY ON WAY HOME.

The officials also have held back money due the lieutenant, apparently unwilling to believe he is alive. Lieut. Gramstorff is at a loss to know what to do with the body, which undoubtedly is that of a wrongly identified soldier.
