Another subject which was discussed at length, was that of purchasing a life membe ship in the woman's building, which is to be erected on the state fair grounds. The corner stone of the building will be laid during the fair this year and after its completion will be used by the farm women for the exhibition of their products at any time during the year. It will be of special use to the out of town women, not only for their exhibits, but as a meeting place. A day nursery will be connected with the building. It was agreed that this matter be left until our next meeting for decision and we hope to have a large number present to expres stheir sentiments. Our speaker for the occasion was Miss Blanche Tarrapt of Greenwood, our district agent. She presented the subject of poultry raising in a very interesting and beneficial manner.
