MEETING OF COUNTY COUNCIL FOR FARM WOMEN.

A recent occurrence of special interest to the Home Demonstration club members was the meeting of the Lexington county council of Farm Women in the Lexington high school auditorium Saturday, September 23d, at 3:30 p. m. Miss Mary C. Wingard presided over the meeting and led the devotional exercises.

The matter of adopting a constitution was brought before the council and after the reading of the one recommended by the state headquarters, it was adopted. Henceforth we as a council have a definite purpose and aim to work toward. May we come near grasping our goal before the year closes. Another subject which was discussed at length, was that of purchasing a life membership in the woman's building, which is to be erected on the state fair grounds. The corner stone of the building will be laid during the fair this year and after its completion will be used by the farm women for the exhibition of their products at any time during the year. It will be of special use to the out of town women, not only for their exhibits, but as a meeting place. A day nursery will be connected with the building. It was agreed that this matter be left until our next meeting for decision and we hope to have a large number present to express their sentiments. The concluding business item was the appointing of the following committee by the president to assist the county agent in putting up an exhibit at the county fair. Mrs. J. James Lindler, Mrs. W. J. Smith, and Miss Janette Wingard.

Our speaker for the occasion was Miss Blanche Tarrant of Greenwood, our district agent. She presented the subject of poultry raising in a very interesting and beneficial manner. Miss Tarrant believes the community poultry association to be advantageous in that it permits cooperative marketing of a first class product, which is absolutely essential in handling large quantities of poultry products. The remainder of the lecture concerned the matter of production. Some hints for the use of simple preventative measures were given. The amount of potassium permanganate that can be placed on a dine put in an ordinary size pan of draining water will keep the flock in a healthy condition. White diarrhea of chicks can be prevented by giving the chick a drop of sour butter milk a few hours after it is hatched. Keeping the premises in and around the poultry yard in a sanitary condition is very important in guarding against diseases. It has been the experience of many, that preventing a disease is easier than curing it.

Everyone present enjoyed Miss Tarrant's address to the utmost and a rising vote of thanks was given her before adjournment. It was agreed by the council that our next meeting be in the form of a rally sometime in November. May we have a full attendance.

LARGE DELIVERY OF COTTON TO COOPERATIVE.

Columbia, Sept. 25.—The largest delivery of old cotton yet made to the South Carolina Cotton Growers' Cooperative Association was made last week by Josh Kirven, who turned over 45 bales of staple cotton to the association. Delivery of this cotton under the terms of the contract was optional with Kirven decided that he would sell the cotton through the association.

Officials of the association say that old cotton is pouring in from every section of the state. Members of the

organization are delighted with the advances which they are receiving, according to letters which are being received at headquarters. The association is now making an initial advance of 12 cents a pound on short staple, old and new cotton and 18 cents a pound on long staple, old and new.

The first fire to occur in association cotton was in Lee county Monday afternoon when some cotton belonging to L. D. Welch, of Elliott, was burned enroute from the gin to the depot. Mr. Welch notified the association Tuesday at noon of his loss and Wednesday at noon the association had a check from the insurance company for the cotton.

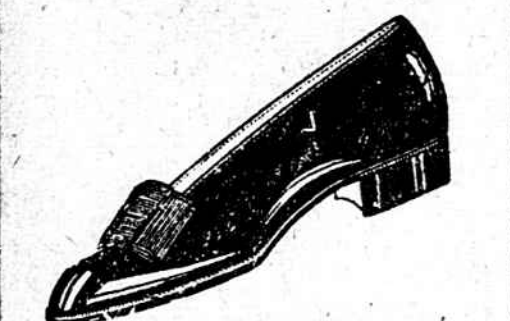
