American Armenians Petition Right Their Congress to Wrongs.

Mr. Walker (Rep. of Massachusetts) offered a resolution from the naturalized Armenians of the United States, nine-tenths of whom, he said, lived in his district, and requested that it be printed in the Record. The resolution reads as follows:

"Whereas there are many naturalized American citizens of Armenian birth now resident in the United States, and

"Whereas the Turkish government continues unjustly and forcibly to collect personal taxes of such naturalized American citizens by imprisoning and otherwise oppressing their relatives, and

"Whereas the Turkish government neither permits such naturalized American citizens to re-enter its territory or to visit their families, nor, on the other hand, allows these families to come to this country, and

"Whereas such wives and children having the rights of American citizens, by virtue of the naturalization of the head of the family, having been and are exposed to outrage and destruction in the cities which have lately been given over to massacre and plunder; therefore, be it
