nal Published at Paris.
New York, Oct. 11 — The city
of Paris, France, is to have the
world's highest priced paper. It
will be called Le Journal Internat-
ionale, and will be edited by Theo-
dore Stanton, an American, although
printed in French. Copies are to
be sold at ten cents each.

The object of the publication will
be to regard all affairs, particular-
ly those of political nature, from
an international standpoint. An in-
ternational advisory board com-
posed of prominent statesmen from
the chief countries of the world
will meet once a year to consider
the policy of the paper.
