### METHODIST WOMEN HOLD MEETING

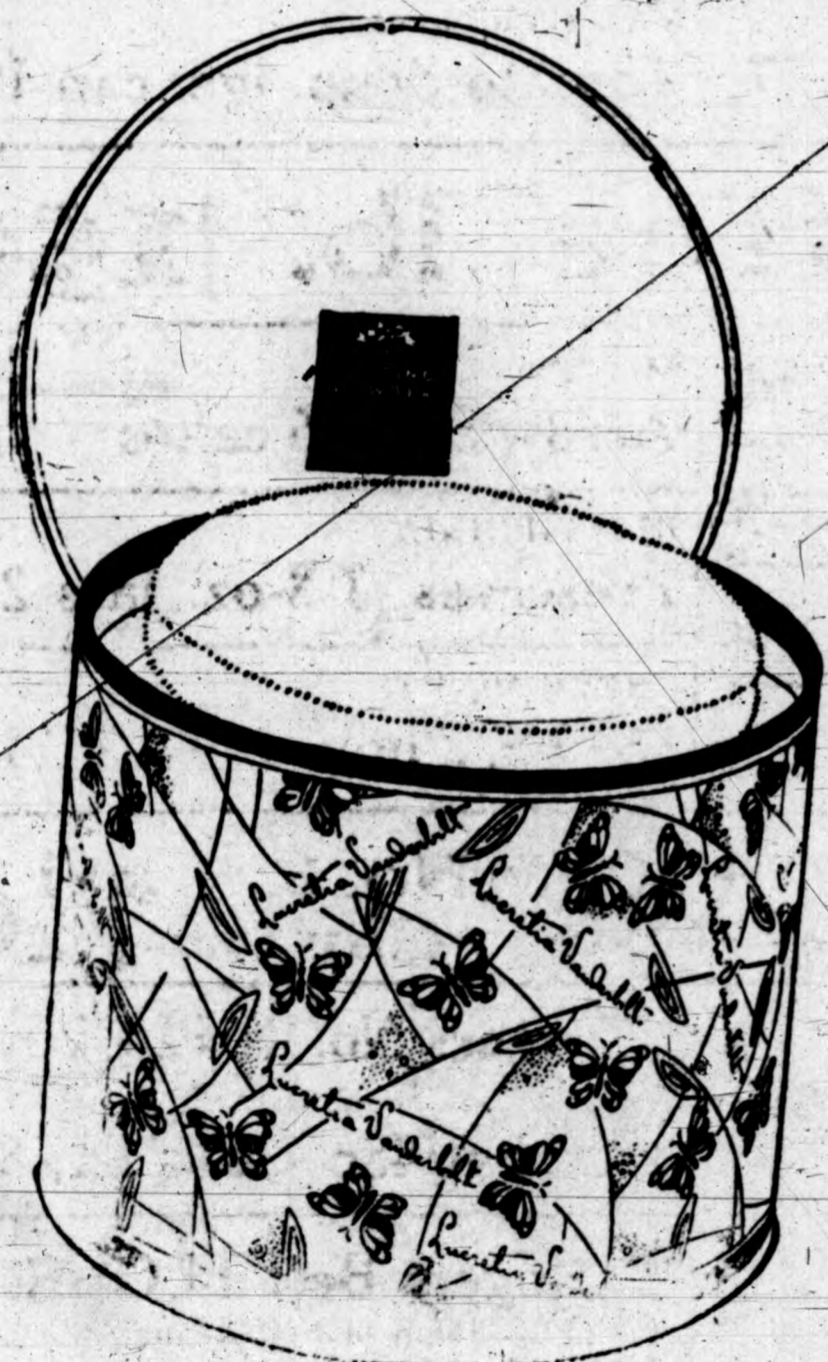
