

Livestock Guide For January Attention

Clemson, Dec. 28.—To start the new year right with livestock, extension livestock men suggest these ideas for January:

Animal Husbandry
See that all classes of livestock have shelter and ample bedding. Feed workstock all they will eat of good quality roughage and just enough

concentrates to keep them in good flesh. Keep salt before all animals. Haul out manure and scatter on areas to be cultivated. Allow plenty of fresh air in barns but avoid drafts. Repair pasture fences.

Dairying

Make inventory of livestock, feed and equipment. Decide now whether you will have silage next fall and plan for its production. Analyze herd records and decide where you can improve in management and feeding. Repair pasture fences, clean out undergrowth, and stop washes in pastures. Plan now for improving permanent pastures. Start the new year right by keeping daily milk and feed records on each cow.

Poultry

Mate breeders for hatching eggs. Make special breeding pen of best hens and pedigreed male to produce cockerels for next year's matings. Provide breeders with green range. Go tready for baby chicks. Move brooder houses to new ground before starting chicks.
