

Ask Appropriations Close To \$11,000,000

Columbia, Dec. 3—Heads of state departments and institutions asked 1937-38 appropriations totaling \$2,379,908 more than present expenditures, budget commission figures showed today.

Meeting behind closed doors the budget group pondered pleas for \$10,813,199 for the support of state departments, educational, charitable and penal institutions. Appropriations for the current year total \$8,433,291.

Present requests also exceed those presented to the budget commission last year when officials asked \$9,770,550, or \$1,337,264 more than was finally appropriated.

Desired increases, officials told the commission, would be used mainly for salary raises, although some have asked for permanent improvements and enlargement of institutions.

Governor Olin Johnston, chairman of the commission, said the commission had not yet adopted a policy as to action on requests for increased salaries.

State Superintendent of Education James H. Hope asked that salaries of white school teachers be raised from \$75 to \$85 a month and that negro teachers be raised ten per cent. Chairman W. G. Query of the state tax commission asked a general increase for state employes.

The budget commission recessed today for a week and was expecting to complete its work by the middle of the month.

\$11,000,000 Paid Out To Veterans

Columbia, Dec. 5—Postmaster E. C. Goza reported today that World War veterans in South Carolina had received \$10,300,000 from the Columbia postoffice since the adjusted service bonds were issued June 15.

Approximately \$1,000,000 in bonds were handled through the Spartanburg and Charleston postal authorities during the first two months of payment, bringing total received in the state to well over \$11,000,000.

Officials estimated that between \$6,000,000 and \$8,000,000 worth of certificates are still in the hands of veterans of the state.
