Register Under Selective  
Service Act.

Next Monday, February 14, has been designated by the President of the United States as third registration day for all men 20 to 45 years of age. All men who have attained the age of 20 on Dec. 1, 1940, and who have not yet registered, must do so by the 16th day of this month, and who have registered must re-register. All registration will be done at the post office, 100 S. Main Street, from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m.
