On Victory Gardening

CONSIDER PLACE AND TYPE OF SOIL FOR YOUR GARDEN

Are you trying to make up your mind whether the space in your backyard is worth trying to raise vegetables in?

Agriculture department experts point out that Victory garden vegetables are only as good as the plot they're grown in. Therefore, before you start spading around, consider these factors:

In order to produce healthy, vitamin-loaded vegetables your plot should have at least five hours a day of sunlight—preferably morning light since the sun is more beneficial then. Then plot should be free of tree roots and should be well drained. Don't

waste your energy if your plot has too much clay.

However, all suitable land should be used. Some companies are not only plowing unused land for employees, but will have it harrowed, fertilized and readied for planting. The employees will do their own planting and cultivating and use the produce on their own tables.

Rising food costs and rationing provides a powerful stimulus for gardeners.
