### POLICE FINES FOR YEAR \$20,031.13

Drunk and Disorderly Conduct Cases Lead Docket. 1,560 Arrested.

A total of \$20,031.13 was collected in mayor's court here during 1947, according to the annual report filed with city council by Chief B. B. Ballard. The amount was collected from 1,560 persons arrested during the

In addition to the regular report on recorder cases, a large number of cases for major crimes were submitted to the F. B. I. in Washington by the department.

As was the general rule each month, drunk and disorderly conduct accounted for the major portion of the fines, with \$8,046.23 for drunk and \$1,709 for disorderly conduct. 617 arrests for drunkenness were made during the year.


